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## AN ENGLISH VIEW

One of the most striking effects of the naval controversy in Canada is to be seen in its influence upon Old Country opinion, which is becoming more and more seized with the grave dangers involved in the adoption of Mr. Borden's centralizing policy. The fact that Canada's participation in the naval defences of the Empire should have become the bone of a fierce party controversy in Canada has been deplored by all parties, other than the ultra-Imperialists. But above all it is being realized that the proposals of Mr. Borden, threatening as they do, the principle of self-government, which is the very foundation stone of imperial unity, carry with them the gravest political consequences, both for the Dominion and the Empire.

This view is powerfully presented under the heading "Right and Wrong Ways with the Colonies," in the London Nation, in which that great Liberal weekly strongly deprecates Mr. Churchill's recent decision to replace the three proposed Canadian Dreadnoughts by three vessels to be begun at once in the British shipyards. It says:

"Four years ago the Admiralty came to the wise conclusion to respect Canadian autonomy in naval matters; Mr. McKenna said, with much wisdom, of the desire of the Dominions to acquire local navies that 'other considerations than those of strategy alone must be taken into account.' At last, commented the Times, the Dominions had 'educated the Admiralty up to their own point of view.' Unfortunately this policy has now been reversed, and the Admiralty has half-cajoled and half-frightened the Dominion down and back to its own abandoned line of Imperial defence. With what result? We have not gained our three Dreadnoughts; and we have lost half the Canadian nation for willing co-operation in the naval concerns of the Motherland. A few months ago naval defence was not a party question in Canada. Mr. Borden was for a Canadian fleet, auxiliary to the Imperial Navy, 'The proper line on which we should proceed in that regard,' he said in 1909, 'is the line of having a Canadian naval force of our own.' That was the traditional Conservative policy, as expounded by Sir John Macdonald; and Sir Wilfrid Laurier's defeated scheme was merely its Liberal counterpart. Who changed it? Mr. Churchill and his non-existent 'emergency,' under which Canada had been offered a share in an 'Imperial Squadron' which is no more Imperial than the rest of the fleet, and is a mere item in an anti-German sum which our Admiralty are always adding up afresh and bringing to a different total. Now Liberal and French Canada, led by the greatest Liberal statesman in the Dominions, draw back in hot and bitter resentment; political machinery is turned on to smash the Borden scheme; a fierce war of parties is opened, with Imperial defence and even the Imperial connection as its ground of quarrel. Downing Street interference becomes once more a cry of Colonial politics in the ears of a generation that had almost forgotten its meaning.

The trial of a rather important case before the King's bench division of the supreme court here this week seems to have revealed some weak spots in connection with the administration of criminal justice in this country. In the first place the high sheriff is too old to properly discharge the duties of the position he holds, and is therefore compelled to depend upon others who are not as conscientious and as zealous of the public interests as he is. One result of this is that men are frequently found serving on juries who have no right to be there. In the second place the Attorney General of the province should personally prosecute important criminal cases whenever it is at all possible for him to do so. If he is compelled by circumstances to delegate the work to others he

should at least allow them ample time to familiarize themselves with all details of the case and the law bearing on the same.

The people of Chatham, Conservatives as well as Liberals handed out some straight talk to Minister Cochrane during his recent visit to that town, and they were amply justified in doing so. They do not propose to allow an autocratic cabinet minister from Ontario to ride rough shod over them. The Borden Government's proposal to tear up the rails of the section of the Canada Eastern Railway between Blackville and Nelson is one of the rankest we have ever heard of and should be fought by the people of that section to the last ditch. What is the use of spending thousands of dollars in an effort to bring settlers into New Brunswick when the government is endeavoring to deprive fifteen hundred sturdy residents of Northumberland County of railway facilities they have enjoyed for years. "What we have we hold" should be the motto of the people of New Brunswick.

Another C. P. R. official in the person of Mr. Collingwood R. Brown, has been added to the staff of the government railway system. He has accepted the appointment of chief engineer. The big corporation seems to be getting in its work these days.

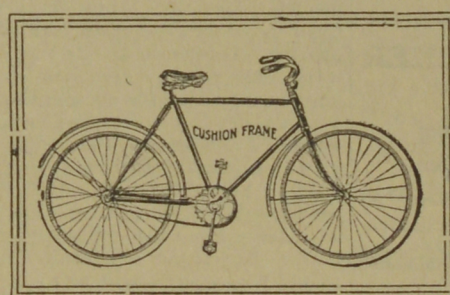
