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

CHAMPIONSHIP BOUT AT GLACE BAY ON DOMINION DAY

McIntyre, Glace Bay Meets Griffiths, of Minneapolis--Both Contend for Welterweight Championship

Glace Bay, N. S., June 27--The first world's championship fight ever held in Eastern Canada takes place in Glace Bay on Dominion Day, when Mickey McIntyre of Glace Bay, and Billy Griffiths, of Minneapolis, will fight here for the welterweight championship of the world. Griffiths has already won a decision over Ray Bronson, who claims the title, and a few weeks ago McIntyre secured a decision over him in Calgary. The bout is the biggest affair ever staged in Eastern Canada and hundreds from all parts of the province are expected to attend. Both men are in great shape and Griffiths wagers one thousand of his own coin that he secures the decision. Tommy Burns, in an interview in the Erie, Penna., Press, states that Griffiths, is designed to become the welterweight championship of the world. There is great enthusiasm here over the fight and McIntyre's friends are confident he wins.
