

MARRIAGE MAY BE NULL NO NEED FOR SEPARATION

Montreal, June 25—The complicated martial affairs of Mrs. Joseph Giroux (Virginie Bradley) and her husband will shortly, it is believed, be brought to a close. Mrs. Giroux sued her husband for separation before Mr. Justice Demers on the alleged grounds of cruelty and non-support. When the case was called, however, evidence was brought forward that the lady's husband was her late husband's brother. Ipso facto, if that were the case, the marriage was null and void. Judge and counsel were nonplussed, and the case was put back indefinitely for counsel to decide what to do under the strange circumstances. The plea, it is understood, will now be amended, asking the court to declare the marriage null and void. The case will be specially heard.

EXCITING CHASE AFTER INDIAN GIRLS

Brantford, June 26—The Mohawk Indian Institute authorities had a very exciting experience in recapturing two girls who were being taken to Hamilton by friends. A little after eight o'clock the two girls, one fourteen and the other fifteen years of age, were reported to be missing, and while search was being made for them a little girl who lives nearby ran to the Institute to say that two Indian girls were at the home of Mrs. Rose Blanken on Mohawk street, opposite the front gate of the institution.

The principal and duty officers immediately proceeded to the house and were informed by Mrs. Blanken that no children were there. It was discovered that the mother of one of the girls, who it appeared was a friend of Mrs. Blanken, was in the house.

After a few minutes one of the girls attempted to climb out of the window and dropped into the arms of one of the officers, who was able to take care of her. The other succeeded in getting out of another window, aided by her mother, who tried to hold the officers back. She gave the officer a good two hundred yards chase in the dark over fences and through back yards, until she was finally captured by the boys' master. Tickets to Hamilton were found in the possession of one of the girls and just as the authorities were taking the children back to the school a back drove up which had evidently been ordered to convey the party to the railway station.

Mrs. Blanken and her Indian friend boarded the 10.45 car at Murray street bridge for Hamilton. It is not known for what purpose the girls were being enticed away but the authorities have their suspicions. Action will be taken against the women concerned.

NEW ENGINEER FOR INTERCOLONIAL

Montreal, June 26—The appointment is announced of Collingwood B. Brown to the position of chief engineer of the government railways in Canada.

Since graduating in civil engineering on Cornell, fourteen years ago Mr. Brown has been in the employ of the Canadian Pacific railway, filling various engineering positions from rodman to principal assistant engineer, a post to which he was appointed two years ago, and which he now resigns to become head of the government railway engineering department.

Mr. Brown is very well known both in eastern and western Canada, having been in turn resident engineer at London (Ont.); assistant divisional engineer at Calgary, division engineer at St. John (N.B.) and Montreal, before becoming chief assistant of the C.P.R.

Although a graduate of an American college, Mr. Brown is a Canadian thirty-six years ago, and is thus a comparatively young man. Later he resided with his parents at Oshawa and Ithaca, where he took his college course.

The management of the Intercolonial and Prince Edward Island railways feel they have secured a particularly and experienced man in the new chief engineer, who will take up his residence at Moncton on July 1.
