Ten cents a pound was asked for veal and mutton went for 10 cents per lb and lamb for \$1.00 and \$1.25 a quarter.

SEEKING TO ENTER
NORMAL SCHOOL

Examinations at the Different Stations Throughout the Province on Tuesday Morning---Candidates For Matriculation and Leaving 191

It is evident that the educational authorities of this province do not propose to observe Canada's natal day as the annual examinations for Normal School entrance and University matriculation are scheduled to begin on Tuesday at the several stations throughout the province. The number of candidates for normal school entrance is 856, while 173 will take matriculation and eight the leaving exams. This is quite up to last year's total.

The examinations are to begin on Tuesday morning and end on Friday. The number of candidates for Normal School entrance at the different stations is as follows:

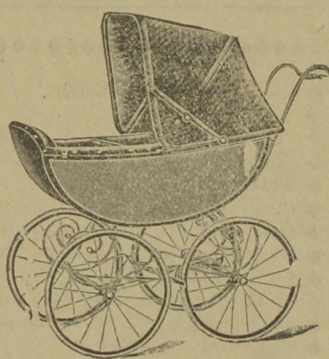
