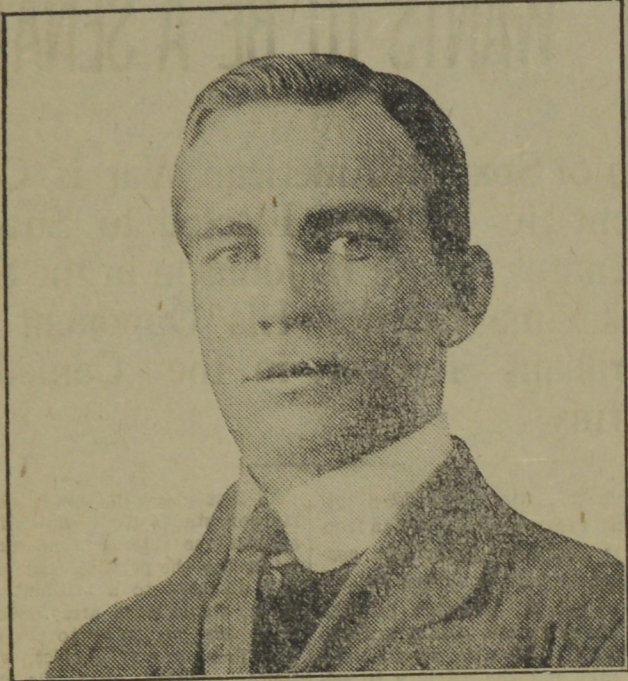

STRAY TOPICS FROM LITTLE OLD NEW YORK

New York, N. Y., July 3—The recent removal of the little white cottage in which Edgar Allan Poe wrote "The Raven" and where he spent the greater part of his brief but happy wedded life, aroused great interest, and in many instances strong criticism on the part of admirers of America's poet and fictionist. The cottage stood on the Kingsbridge road in the Borough of the Bronx and was removed from the original site to a new foundation prepared for it in Poe Park, distant about two blocks. The park covers about two blocks and the cottage was placed at the northern end, preserving in all the details its appearance on the previous site.

Fear on the part of the big New York gem importers that they will have to pay a higher duty on gems under the new tariff has caused them to rush in large quantities of diamonds and other precious stones since the provisions of the bill became known under the present tariff schedule the cut gems are dutiable at 10 per cent., and there is no duty on the rough product. The Underwood bill provides for a duty of 20 per cent., on cut and 10 per cent. on uncut gems. The New York gem merchants, working through their association, are fighting for a retention of the present schedule. Meanwhile they are bringing in unusually large quantities of the precious stones in order to escape possible payment of the higher duties proposed.

Colonel Roosevelt has announced his plans for the coming summer and fall and thereby set at rest the rumors that he intended to take an active part in the coming municipal campaign. The schedule as announced shows that he will be away from New York during practically the whole of the campaign. Next week the Colonel with his sons, Archie and Quentin will start for a two months camping trip in the Grand Canyon of Arizona. When he returns he will spend a week at Oyster Bay but his time will be taken up preparing for the trip to the Argentine Republic which he will make early in October. It is now announced that in addition to his visit to Argentina he will probably extend his trip to Brazil and Chile.

The Emancipation Proclamation Commission, created by the legislature to commemorate the semi-centennial of emancipation and to provide for an exhibition and celebration in New York City has decided to hold the exhibition in one of the city armories during the last ten days of October. There will be fifteen divisions to exhibit, covering practically every detail of the progress of the negro here in the last fifty years, including the distribution of the negro race throughout the world and the growth of the negro population here; vital statistics and physical developments, occupations, industries and agriculture, inventions by negroes, progress in education, religious work, civil status, political power, home life, business advance and social uplift; work of colored women, work of negro artists, collection of negro literature, architectural work and music, composed and performed by negroes.

The death of Mrs. B. Caroline B. Martin which occurred a few days ago in the New Jersey State Hospital for the Insane, recalls one of the strongest cases that the officials of this vicinity have been called upon to solve. This is the so-called O'cey Snead murder. It was on November 29, 1909, that Mrs. O'cey Snead was found dead in a bath tub in a house in East Orange, N.J. It was at first believed to be a case of suicide but official investigation led to the arrest of Mrs. Martin and her sister Miss Virginia O. Wardlaw, aunt of the victim. All of those concerned belonged to a proud old Southern family that had sunk from affluence to poverty. When they first came north they resided for a time at the Waldorf-Astoria in this city but with the giving out of their funds they sought obscure lodgings, first in Brooklyn and later in some of the New Jersey suburbs. Their life was enshrouded in the deepest mystery. From the time of their ar-

rest on a charge of murder both Mrs. Martin and Miss Wardlaw declined to make any statement that would shed light on the case. The only motive that could be assigned for the murder was a desire to secure (Mrs. Snead's insurance.) Miss Wardlaw committed suicide in jail during the trial. Mrs. Martin was convicted on a plea of manslaughter and sentenced to seven years in prison. Subsequently she was adjudged insane and taken to the asylum where she died.

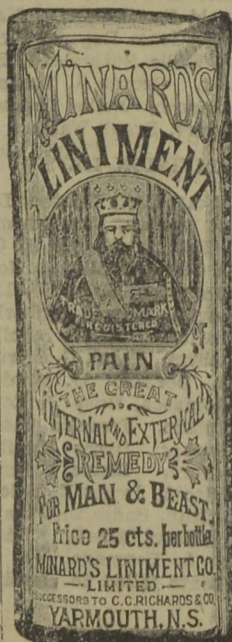
