### OUTRAGE ON PROMINENT CITIZEN BY CUSTOMS DEPT

Ex-Ald. Joseph Walker Wrongfully Accused of Smuggling and Seizure of His Motor-car Threatened By Preventive Officer

Ex-Ald. Joseph Walker recently was the victim of an outrage perpetrated through the Customs Department either by overzealous stupidity or malice on the part of some person or persons. Mr. Walker has been charged with smuggling an automobile tire from the United States and on instructions from Ottawa was ordered to pay a fine also the price of the tire he was charged with smuggling, failing that he was to have his car seized by the government. Ex-Ald. Walker has not been smuggling tires and has told the Customs Department so in unmistakable language. Wires between Fredericton and Ottawa have been kept hot and a back-down on the part of the department has followed. Mr. O. S. Crockett, M. P., has been notified by Mr. Walker of the occurrence and the matter will not rest.

Ex-Ald. Walker left with his party to spend Dominion Day at St. Stephen and other places nearby. Before leaving he purchased a pair of tires from the Fredericton Garage and had them placed upon his car. While the party was at St. Stephen a storm set in and the car was left in the garage there on account of the poor condition of the roads. Three days later Mr. Harold Walker, son of the ex-alderman brought the car to Fredericton.

### LACK OF FUNDS STOPS GOVERNMENT FROM LAYING WALK

Hon. John Morrissey Says He Favors Proposal of City and Will Consider It Next Year—Paving Held Up

The program of the Roads and Streets Department for the construction of the paving of Queen Street from St. John Street to University Avenue has been interfered with on account of the inability of the Provincial Government to perform this year the work which was conditional for the paving of Queen Street to Church Street.

The City Council made the proposal that the street should be paved with Tarvia if the Provincial Public Works Department would lay concrete walk and combined curb and gutter along the front of the grounds of the Parliament Building. This proposition of the City Council was made known to Hon. Mr. Morrissey, minister of Public Works through Lt. Col. Loggie, president of the Local Improvement Association. The minister replied that he strongly favored the proposition but that nothing could be done this year as no appropriation had been made for it. Next year he would take the matter into consideration and try to have the necessary funds provided.

On account of this announcement the paving of Queen Street between St. John and Church streets will not be undertaken this year. The Street Department however has already undertaken the paving of Queen Street.

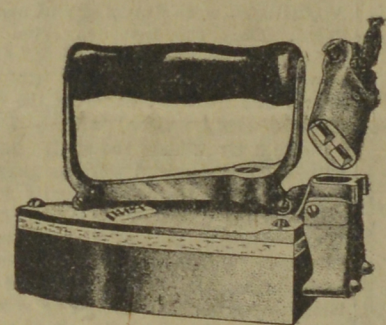

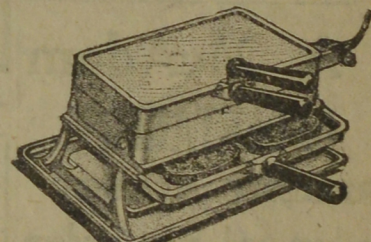
