MUCH MONEY SPENT IN BOOSTING

Town Development of New York, a magazine for the man who believes in himself and in his town," and edited by an expert on town development, says that a publicity campaign to be entirely successful must be persistently carried on and must necessarily demand the expenditure of large sums of money.

Town Development has the following interesting notes on publicity for cities, which clearly indicates that when a substantial amount of money is expended good results can be expected.

The Board of Trade of Scranton, Pa., has completed its industrial fund of \$100,000.

Waco, Texas, believes that publicity will assist in building up a great city, but there has been some difference of opinion as to the methods which will reach the eyes and ears of the investors. It is proposed to raise a \$50,000 fund for boosting.

When the Merchants' Association of Springfield, Ill., proposed to secure subscriptions for a \$100,000 industry development fund, one-sixth of the amount was subscribed in five minutes.

It is announced that Lethbridge, Alberta, Canada, has secured the services of Secretary J. P. Tracy, of the Saginaw Board of Trade. He has a three year contract at \$6,000 a year. The position is that of Industrial Commissioner. Lethbridge is a rich mining town and the council gives the Board of Trade \$25,000 a year for operating expenses.

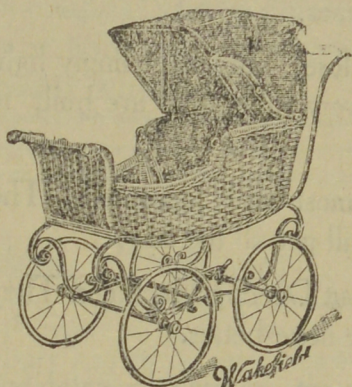

HAD AUTO RIDE

The St. John yachtsmen or such of them as could be accommodated, were last evening entertained to an auto ride about the city. Unfortunately there were not sufficient cars available and about a dozen of the visitors were left behind. This number would have been reduced if several young men belonging to the city had declined invitations to take the ride.

The attention of owners of dogs within the City limits is directed to the following provisions of the City By-law relating to dogs:—

"Every owner of a dog shall register such dog at the office of the City Treasurer on or before the FIRST DAY OF AUGUST in each year the tax or fee for each registration shall be ONE DOLLAR, which must be paid to the City Treasurer before registration."

"The owner of any male dog who has not registered it on or before the first day of August as aforesaid may register such dog at any time up to the first day of September next succeeding on payment to the City Treasurer a tax or fee of TWO DOLLARS; but if such registration is not made until after the first day of September and previous to the first day of January next succeeding the tax or fee for such registration shall be THREE DOLLARS."

The tax or fee for female dogs is fixed at FOUR DOLLARS if not registered before August first and at FIVE DOLLARS afterwards.
