FIREMEN DID GOOD WORK AT KITCHEN'S STABLE

One Thousand Dollars Damage by Fire Early This Morning—Cause Unknown—Horses Let Out and Are Uninjured

Coles Kitchen's livery stable at the corner of Westmorland and King Streets was damaged by fire to a considerable extent between midnight and one o'clock this morning. The rear of the stable was practically destroyed. Some seven tons of hay and thirty sleight which were stored at the stable were damaged more or less by fire, smoke and water. The fire adjusters are to be here tonight and will adjust the loss tomorrow. One thousand dollars is the general estimate of the extent of damage. The horses were uninjured being driven out of the building as soon as the fire was discovered.

ORIGIN UNKNOWN

Coles Kitchen, proprietor of the stable left the place a few minutes before the fire broke out. He had noticed no fire at the time of leaving. Passersby on the street also noticed no fire. Shortly after midnight Barney Delong who was sitting at his door on King Street saw flames break through the roof at the rear of the stable and gave the alarm. The fire was over the horse stable and among the hay. The origin is unknown. The stable employees were notified and they at once turned the horses into the street.

NIGHT AND DAY CREWS TO WORK ON DRAW-SPAN

Foundation Company Preparing to Rush Work on Contract—Will Alter Temporary Span to Permit of Work

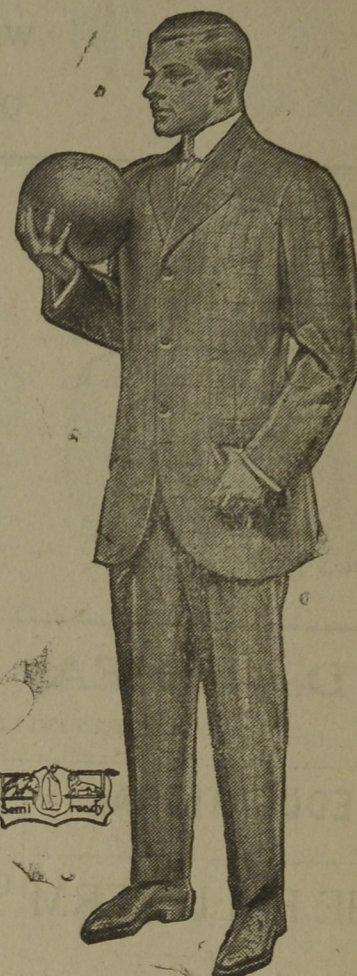
Night and day crews are to be put on the re-construction of the draw-span of the Highway Bridge within ten days by The Foundation Company, Limited which has the contract with the Provincial Public Works Department. A. R. Armstrong who has been here for some weeks as representative of the company, will have charge of one of the crews and Supt. Ripley, who arrived here a few days ago the other. Chief Foreman McLean is also here on the work. He recently was on a contract when the company has at the Red River near Winnipeg. Mr. Ripley has been on a contract at Pitt River near Coquitlam, B. C.

Piling has been driven on the upper side of the temporary span and a derrick will be erected upon it. The centre portion of the temporary span is to be taken out and a truss passing over the spot where the pier is to be rebuilt will be substituted. The Foundation Company, Limited, is advertising for carpenters and laborers. Carpenters are scarce. A large crew of men is now at work making preparations. Lumber for the coffer-dam procured from the Greer Lumber Company of Montreal has arrived and long lumber for the erection of a derrick has arrived from J. A. Likely of St. John. A small derrick is being built on a scow to raise the masonry of the overturned pier and the larger one is to be built later.
