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## COMPARISONS THAT COUNT

Lord Emmott, under secretary of state for Great Britain, speaking at Ottawa on July 25th last, said:

"Wise parents do not attempt to continue the state of tutelage too long lest friction arise which might conclude in separation."

"Twenty years ago there had been too much interference from Downing Street. This was not so now but there was still a tendency to forget that the connection was one of human interest."

"IF I READ THE SITUATION ARIGHT, CANADA HAS DECIDED TO HELP BUT HAS NOT YET DECIDED IN WHAT FORM THAT HELP IS TO BE GIVEN. CANADA WILL DECIDE THIS IN HER OWN GOOD TIME. We in the mother country await that decision with complete confidence in the patriotism of her people and their loyalty to the throne, our empire, and in their firm determination to take a proper and adequate share in the burden which we are called upon to bear."

Sir Wilfrid Laurier, in the House of Commons on June 6th last, said:

"The truth is, the Senate has done nothing but defend the rights of the Canadian people. They have not rejected the Naval Aid Bill as they might have done; they have simply said they did not feel called upon to give it their assent until it had been submitted to the judgment of the country. MY RIGHT HON. FRIEND (Mr. Borden) FORGETS THAT ACCORDING TO CONSTITUTIONAL USAGE THE WAY TO GET OUT OF A DIFFICULTY OF THIS KIND, . . . IS TO APPEAL TO THE PEOPLE."

Premier Borden in parliament on the same occasion:

"The construction of these three ships is apparently to be proceeded with by the British government. It is quite out of the question for us at the moment to make any advance or approach to the imperial authority. . . . It is the firm determination of this government to bring down at a later date a proposal for the acquisition or construction of three battleships as was proposed in the Naval Aid Bill of 1912. . . . Canada will take over and pay for these ships and will place them at the disposal of His Majesty the King for the common defence of the great empire of which Canada forms a part."

Lord Emmott, British under secretary of state, says that Canada has decided to help and will settle her own course in her own time.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier says that the way to decide the matter is to appeal to the people and leave Canada so decide.

Mr. Borden says that his way out is for the British admiralty to build three ships and for Canada to send over the money to pay for them.

As between the views of Lord Emmott and Sir Wilfrid Laurier on the one side and Premier Borden's centralizing policy on the other side, it should not be difficult for the Canadian people to realize which is the best course for Canada and the empire.

## NINETY-THREE YEARS AGO TODAY

Donald Alexander Smith, created Baron Strathcona and Mount Royal in 1897, and who has been prominent in Canadian public affairs for half a century, was born of humble parents in Scotland August 6, 1820, ninety-three years ago today. He came to Canada in his twentieth year as a clerk in the service of the Hudson Bay Company. He rose in the service to the top-most round and was the last resident governor and chief commissioner of the company at Montreal. In 1870 he was stationed at Fort Garry (now Winnipeg) and was appointed a commissioner by the government to treat with the Riel rebels. Five years later Mr. Smith, as he then was, embarked in the promotion of railroads in the west. He achieved notable success and in time became the richest man in Canada, being the controlling factor in the Canadian Pacific Railway, the Bank of Montreal and the Hudson's Bay Company, of which he is still president. Since 1896 Lord Strathcona has been High Commissioner for Canada in London. For some years previous he was a member of the Canadian parliament.

Montreal Telegraph:—The task of the refusal of the government to entertain any proposal whatever for a Board of Conciliation in the Inter-colonial dispute is a painful reminder that the Hon. Mr. Crothers, the present minister of labor, refused a Conciliation Board to the miners on Vancouver Island and that the collieries there have been tied up since last September as a consequence. Finding afterwards that he had made a mistake, he offered belated assistance, which the mine owners naturally refused to accept. It is foolish of members of the cabinet to announce before they have heard the facts of the case that no Board of Conciliation will be appointed. It is still possible none may be needed, but it is hardly conducive to that happy end to announce that of it is it won't be granted.

The statement is made on behalf of Col. Sam Hughes that the militia colonels selected to go to England to witness the autumn manoeuvres were chosen because of their efficiency. Those who have been declaring that the gallant Colonel McLeod owes his selection to political pull are of course, on the wrong track. They probably got the erroneous idea from the fact that he has not been in camp with his corps for two years.

Premier Borden has to his credit a whole lot of high sounding pre-election promises which he has made no attempt to carry out. The reason is that he never expected to be premier of Canada when he made them.

## FINANCIAL CONDITION

### OF MOOSEJAW

Moose Jaw, Sask., July 29.—The City Council has passed a resolution unanimously condemning a local paper, The Evening Times, for its front page editorial on the financial conditions of the city.

In part the resolution reads as follows:

"That this council desires to place on record its strong disapproval on the article published recently, owing to its gross mis-statements of local conditions, wherein the credit of the city and its business men is impugned and that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the Board of Trade with the request that support be given this motion with a view to restoring confidence in the city which has been seriously impaired by the publication aforesaid."

Moose Jaw, July 29.—Mayor Pascoe emphatically denies the report published in a local paper announcing that the city's bankers have refused to accept cheques drawn by the city. "Any inconvenience that has been experienced in connection with the city's financial arrangements has been caused by our inability to dispose of the city's debentures," said the mayor.
