## LECTURED ON CONCRETE.

Mr. W. A. Toohy of Montreal, representing the Canada Cement Company Limited, gave a very interesting lecture on concrete street and highway construction last night after the meeting of the City Council. The lecture was delivered in the Council Chamber and was well illustrated by lantern views. Referring to the Has-sam pavement on Queen and Carleton streets Mr. Toohy said the city had a concrete pavement that would wear well with little cost of maintenance. Concrete pavements today however, are smoother than that in this city.

NEW GROUND  
FOR APPEAL IN  
SCOTI ACT CASE

Conviction Given in Second Offence Case against West End Hotel-- Notice of Appeal Given by Counsel

Judgement was given yesterday afternoon by the Police Magistrate in the case against the proprietor of a West End hotel, charged with a second offence against the Canada Temperance Act. A conviction was made and a fine of one hundred dollars imposed. Mr. R. B. Hanson appeared as counsel for the accused, and gave notice of appeal from the judgment of the court.

The ground for the appeal is that the charge for a second offence against the Act must be the same as that in the proven first offence, both being either for selling liquor or for keeping it for sale.

Police Magistrate Marsh has always taken the view that it is immaterial whether selling or keeping for sale is charged, either being an offence against the Act.

The Police Magistrate stated today that in his lengthy experience with Canada Temperance Act cases, an appeal never had been made on the grounds set forth by Mr. Hanson.

City Clerk McCready who appeared as prosecuting counsel stated that an appeal had been made on such a ground some years ago and the contention of the police magistrate upheld.
