A CONFESSION

FLORENCE FAIRBANKS ON EADS AND FASHIONS

New York, April 26—The warm season is rapidly approaching and the thoughts of practical women turn to cotton goods and other summer materials. The shops display a most wonderful variety of such goods just now, all of them beautiful and attractive but, judging from their texture and the nature of their weave it seems extremely doubtful that many of these materials would bear tubbing. They are nominally classed as "washgoods," but the honest dealers invariably inform their customers that the washing quality of these goods could not be guaranteed. They advise purchasers to have the materials dry-cleaned.

There are, undoubtedly, many materials which will bear washing in the tub, but this can be determined only after making a thorough test with a sample of the goods. The solid colored ratines, eponges, velours, and similar materials will not soil quickly and, even if it should be found that they will not bear tubbing, it will not matter much, because it would not cost a great deal to have them dry-cleaned once in a great while.

There is a great difference in the ratines. Some have a deep, loose pile and others a rather hard cord finish with comparatively few and very short "nubbins." The latter undoubtedly will give better service. These ratines are very good for coat suits. For young women the combination of Russian blouse and plain skirt is the best model to follow in this fabric. Some of the blouse suits in yellow, or leather colored, ratine are most attractive this year. For an older woman a good model was shown in lavender. It was made with a plain skirt and strictly tailored coat. The only trimming was buttons of lavender and white on both coat and skirt.

Tunics are used in a great many of the wash dresses, in both heavy and lightweight materials. They are becoming to most people and give an opportunity for the display of originality in design and trimming. With the tunic it is possible also to have a frock which seems to be rather elaborate yet can be done up by the average laundress.

The thin materials, such as embroidered batiste, voile, crepe and mousseline, are frequently made up in bunched skirts. The return to the double or tripled once is indeed one of the most conspicuous things in the summer styles. But these bounces are extremely scant. And the lower one generally has even less fullness than the upper one, so as to give the prevailing effect of narrowness at the ankles.

All-over openwork embroideries are also made up in bunched skirts. They are used, too, for tunics, in which they are combined with lace and are worn over a foundation skirt which is an elaborate mixture of plain material, with two or three different kinds of lace. This use of several different kinds of lace is characteristic of many of the high-priced gowns. As a rule, however, these models are so elaborate as to be impossible for the average woman, both because of their initial cost and because of the difficulty and expense of having them cleaned.

Sleeves in the cotton frocks are seldom full length. In many of the more dressy ones they stop just above the elbow. Necks are almost universally open, a summer fashion which deserves to be perpetuated. Some of the long sleeves have fullness which is brought into a cuff, but this fullness does not form a deep pouch. Other sleeves have rather a wide mouth, something like a child's short sleeve.

Lace or net frills ornament most of the necks and sleeves. Tiny ruffles of half-inch Valenciennes are used to edge both sides of the front pleat of a waist or to outline the waistcoat effects.

Linen in spite of the fact that it wrinkles so quickly seems to have achieved the same secure position in summer wardrobes that serge holds for other seasons. It is best perhaps in the loose weaves, although they are more liable to shrink. A variation from the usual linen frock is to make the skirt of plain material and provide it with a belted jacket, something like a Russian blouse but more open in front and with a fuller pleat. This jacket may be of flowered chin and the edges are bound with plain linen in one of the colors of the flowers.

Most of the plain skirts lap at one side of the front and are finished with several buttons, generally at the knee. Occasionally, however, other ornaments in the style of the military frog are used instead of the buttons. The frogs are made of washable braid and are quite attractive.

Velvet used to be considered only for winter, but this season some of the best examples are of velvet. Satin now looks a bit old and dry. In fact, in the new vivid dyes, they are much too hated and difficult unless in soft velvet. Effects for spring and summer are going to be extremely bright. If a dark tone be the foundation of a gown, then garnishes must be exceedingly brilliant. There is little doubt

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

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


