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DR. PUGSLEY AND MR. HAZEN

St. John people are calling public meetings and protesting against the inaction of the govt with respect to adequate wharf accommodation. Where is the wonderful Mr. Hazen? Why does he not take the same interest in the port of New Brunswick's metropolis as Hon. Wm. Pugsley did when he was in the Liberal government. At all times and in every place whether in parliament or the Council Chamber Dr. Pugsley worked for the interests of St. John and New Brunswick. There was no need of public meetings to protest against inaction when he was in power. He not only gave the people what they asked for but he was planning always to increase the progress and prosperity of the city where he lived and which he represented. He was laughed at when he first spoke of the development of Courtenay Bay and to day the Conservatives are eager to claim the credit for the great works and the expenditure of millions of dollars all of which resulted from the plans foresight, courage and loyalty of Hon. William Pugsley. He left everything ready for the signature of the government that succeeded the administration of which he was a member and it was months later before the contract was made.

That was due to inaction or lack of influence on the part of Hon. Mr. Hazen who went further and struck a blow at the progress of St. John by refusing to accept the Cammell-Laurd tender for the construction of naval vessels at St. John, returning the deposit this great English shipbuilding firm had made and ignoring the recommendation left by the Liberal government Surely that nationalist compact made by Borden with Bourassa was a dear bargain for St. John.

More than that it was a great blow to New Brunswick. What the development of a great ship building plant at St. John would have meant to the whole of New Brunswick is hard to say. The iron from Gloucester the coal from Grand Lake, the skill and knowledge of the best craftsmen would have been utilized. It was not to be however. Mr. Hazen was not strong enough. He is a great show window for the Borden Government and that's about all. The public meeting of protest in St. John would never have been held had Hon. Wm. Pugsley remained in power.

Sir E.B. Osler, a millionaire Tory who represents a Toronto constituency in parliament stated in a speech the other day that in the seventeen years he had been at Ottawa he had only listened to two or three good speeches. He also expressed cordial approval of the closure bill. Dr. Michael Clark, the eloquent member for Red Deer who followed the Toronto magnate handed him out the following:

"Mr. Speaker, my hon. friend, has a brother who seriously propagated not long ago the theory that most men should be chloroformed to death at sixty. I never felt so favorably disposed to that theory as I do today. If I held the opinion on the right of free speech, which after all is a somewhat important distinction between man and the lower animals, which my hon. friend holds, I would take a room in an asylum for deaf mutes and stay there for the rest of my life."

In a letter to the St. John Telegraph Tuesday, Mr. E. S. Carter of King's County suggest that the parish supervisors should give a detailed account of their expenditures to the people who pay the road taxes. This is a right proposition. The people who pay for the upkeep of the roads have a right to an accounting showing how their money was spent, where it was spent and who received it. There is no audit so good, so thorough as an audit by the people. The road supervisor who would venture to permit overcharges or employ men unfit for

road making in the face of an audit of his account by his neighbors would soon make place for some one else.

Moncton Transcript:—When the Fenian Raids took place on the frontiers of Canada, one of the first points attacked was the Eastern Townships. The plucky farmers there took down their rifles and went to the frontier and actually fought in defence of the integrity of the territory before the troops could arrive. These men actually smelt powder and took part in real fighting, but under the Tory idea of distributing the Fenian Raid bounties, these men do not get a cent in recognition. It does not seem fair.

Despatches from Ottawa rather leave us in doubt as to the chances for an election. But there is no doubt of the disfavor the 'naval bill' is in. The government pretended that the "gag" rules were the result of the Liberal's effort to delay the passage of the Naval Bill and yet with Closure passed and the gag in force nothing is heard of the "Emergency" or of the famous bill. There would be no surprise if the Naval Bill were "scratched."

ies were initiated with the unveiling of the Thomas Jefferson statue, which occupies a conspicuous position in the rotunda of the memorial hall. Former Governor David R. Francis, as president of the Louisiana Purchase Exposition Company, made an address presenting the memorial to the City of St. Louis and Henry W. Kiel, as mayor, responded. These were followed by several orations on the life and services of Thomas Jefferson and the importance of the purchase of the Louisiana Territory.

The second part of the program consisted of an "educational" parade, which started immediately after the literary exercises were concluded. In line were troops from Jefferson Barracks, the National Guard and Naval Reserves, Boy Scouts, cadets and students from military academies and colleges throughout the middle west and delegations representing numerous patriotic societies and civic organizations. Brig. Gen. E. J. Spencer of the National Guard of Missouri, was the grand marshal of the parade.

The memorial is in the form of a great hall, more than 300 feet in length and constructed entirely of stone and marble. It occupies a conspicuous site near the entrance of Forest Park. The building will be used to house a library and relics interesting from an historical standpoint, of the Louisiana Purchase and of the history of the great section of country embraced in the Louisiana Territory. The memorial was built with a fund of about \$500,000, which was left from the receipts of the Louisiana Purchase Exposition held in St. Louis in 1904.

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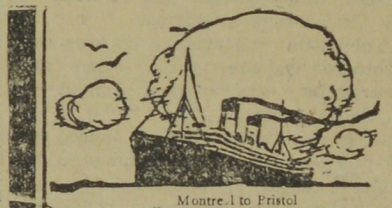
