WEST INDIES TRADE AGREEMENT PASSES THE HOUSE

WEST INDIA BILL PASSED

The third reading of the bill to ratify the West Indies reciprocal trade arrangement was carried in the commons tonight after a final debate lasting all the afternoon and evening.

Frank Carvell submitted an amendment providing that all steamships receiving a subsidy in connection with the reciprocity agreement should ply direct between Canadian ports and the West Indies. If these steamers were permitted to call at United States ports and tranship their cargoes at these foreign calling places, Mr. Carvell maintained that the effect of the arrangement would be to develop trade between the West Indies and the United States rather than between the West Indies and Canada.

Hon. Dr. Pugsley also submitted an amendment providing that there should be placed upon the statute book a standing offer that whenever the West Indies increased their preference on Canadian goods to fifty per cent., then all goods in schedule B should come into Canada free of duty. The government declined to accept either amendment.

In moving the third reading of the measure, Hon. Mr. Perley acting minister in the absence of Hon. Mr. Foster, stated that word had been received from all of the West Indian colonies with the exception of British Guiana stating their endorsement of the pact, and their readiness to bring it into effect by proclamation. A cable had also been received from the Island of Grenada stating that on April 20 the legislative council of the island passed a resolution in favor of joining with the other West Indian colonies in the Canadian agreement.

Mr. Carvell submitted his amendment. He was heartily in favor of the purpose of the agreement as with all efforts to widen Canadian markets and reduce the cost of living. If anything, he was inclined to chide the government for being too niggardly. It might have placed on the free list a greater number of articles. But the only way to make the agreement a success was to build up business between Canada and the West Indies through direct communication. Business had been done in the past, but three-quarters of it had gone through United States channels. Mr. Carvell emphasized the necessity of direct service from Halifax or St. John. He had no brief for the C.P.R., but he believed that company could carry out the scheme perhaps best of all because they would have their own steamship lines and would be able to give a through bill of lading to and from all Canadian ports.

Hon. Mr. Perley said the government was unable to accept Mr. Carvell's amendment, but at the same time the government had no intention of having anything but a direct service. Both Mr. Foster and

himself had come to the conclusion that direct service was necessary. It had been decided to enter into a twelve months contract terminating June 30, 1914, with Pickford & Black of Halifax. This company had gone to England to make the necessary arrangements.

The contract provided for a twelve-days service which called for four boats. Two of these boats would be vessels giving the present service, for which \$5,000 per annum would be paid. Two new boats of 4,500 tons gross register, would be provided, for which \$150,000 would be paid. These boats would be capable of performing a twelve-knot service and would have accommodation for fifty first class, forty second-class, and 200 steerage passengers.

THE TENDERS

The minister gave some details of the efforts made to secure a long-term contract. A number of tenders were received but none was satisfactory. The Royal Mail Steamship Company offered a fortnightly service for \$200,000 but they stipulated that they should be allowed to discontinue it after one year if it was not satisfactory to them.

The Canada-West Indies syndicate offered a fifteen years' service for \$300,000 but they stipulated that they must also receive \$150,000 from the West Indies and British Guiana. Mr. Perley stated that this was not a C.P.R. tender, as had been stated, although C.P.R. people were connected with it. The original offer from this company provided for a call at Boston but exception was taken to this and it was withdrawn. Hon. Mr. Pugsley said it would be a mistake to have steamers call at both St. John and Halifax each trip. It would be better to have calls at the points alternately. He moved an amendment that there should be placed on the Canadian statutes an offer that whenever the West Indies increased to 50 per cent preference to Canada all goods on schedule B should come to Canada duty free from the West Indies.

Finance Minister White said the West Indies could not be expected to give such a reduction. Dr. Pugsley's proposal would hurt Canadian refiners by putting British refined sugar on the free list.

Mr. Carvell said there was no reason why the duty on sugar should not be greatly reduced. It would reduce the cost of living. On division the Pugsley and Carvell amendment was defeated by 90 to 52, a government majority of 38.

The bill was read the third time as were the gold and silver marks bill, the wireless telegraph bill.

To the \$10,000,000 agricultural aid bill, Mr. Oliver moved that parliament each session be asked as to the amount to be spent. The amendment was defeated by 89 to 52.

A committee composed of Messrs. Edward Moore and Peter Farrell and Inspector McKay was appointed to confer with the City Council with regard to a hospital for contagious diseases.

Those present at the meeting were Chairman Wiley, Messrs. Dibblee, Farrell and Moore, Health Inspector McKay, Dr. G. C. McCoy, Plumbing Inspector O'Neill and Secretary Beckwith.

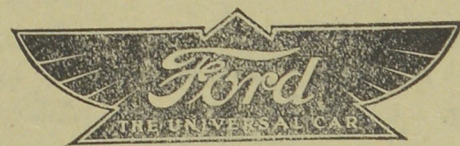
