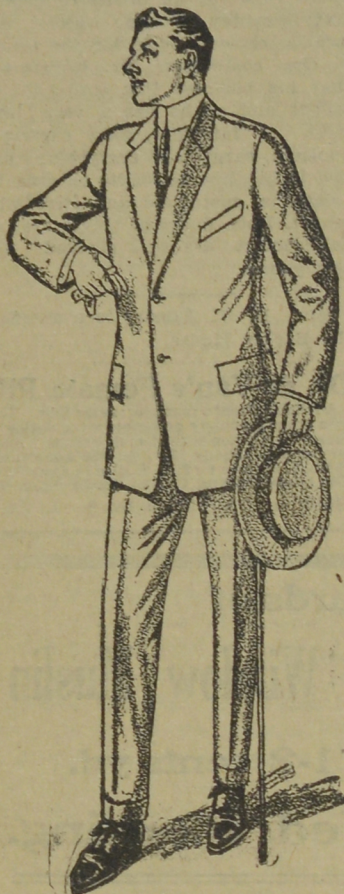

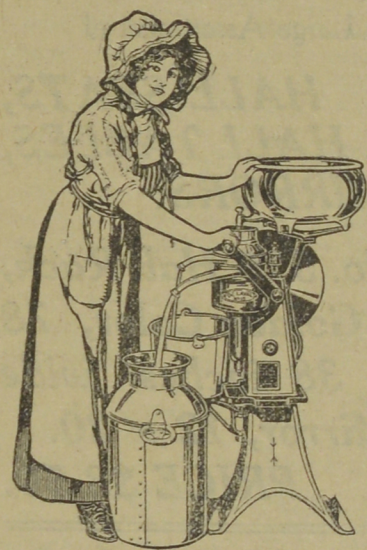

BOSTON RED SOX WANT CHASE FOR FIRST BASE

Deal Now on With New York Highlanders For Famous First Sacker
---Terms Proposed

New York, April 28—The Boston Red Sox would like to secure Hal Chase from the New York Highlanders.

Frank Chance, the Peerless Leader, has decided to play first base, as he figures that he can better develop a team for New York by being in the lineup rather than from the bench.

Hal Chase can play first base with any man living, but is a huge joke in any other position on the ball field; and, what is more, he is of little use at the bat when away from his home position. Manager Chance is satisfied that there is but one place for Chase on a ball team, and that is at first, and as he intends to work that corner of the diamond, why, he will naturally listen to a trade that will help his club.

The Boston club's position is this: Harold Janvrin has been found wanting at first; Clyde Claude Engle has shown to good advantage, but then Engle tires after a few games and, although a fine all-round man, he is not the player Boston wants for a regular position.

This puts it up to Jake Stahl to play the first bag, but Stahl is troubled with bad legs and has very little confidence that he will regain his old form.

With a good hitting first baseman, the club has a splendid chance to win the pennant for the second time, and winning the championship means big financial returns for the club as well as a mountain of glory for the Boston fans.

WANT THREE PLAYERS

New York would like three players, a catcher, an infielder and an outfielder. New York would like Bill Carrigan, but the chances are that Pres. McAleer would not stand for Carrigan going. Nunamaker's name was mentioned by New York, also Neal Ball and Olaf Henriksen.

Although there are three other American League clubs that would like to get Chase, just how the Red Sox have the inside track. There is one stumbling block. Chase is receiving \$8000 for a salary, and few clubs care to pay that much money.

STAHL ADMITS IT

New York, April 29—Manager Stahl of the Boston American League team said today he was trying to arrange a trade that would bring Hal Chase, the famous first baseman of the New York Americans, to Boston. Robert McRory, treasurer of the Boston club left town for Boston simultaneously with Stahl's admission that he was after Chase.

It is reported that President Farrell of the New Yorks, would be given a choice of any one of the Boston catchers; also that he might receive Outfielder Henriksen and Infielders Janvrin and Ball. Officers of the New York club refused to discuss the matter.

The decision was unpopular, and the crowd voiced its disapproval.

WISCONSIN-ILLINOIS LEAGUE

Washington, D. C., April 30—President Wilson will leave the capital tomorrow morning for the first speech-making trip he has taken since he was inaugurated last month. He is going to his home State of New Jersey to speak to the people in behalf of jury reform and other legislative measures in the fate of which he is greatly interested.
