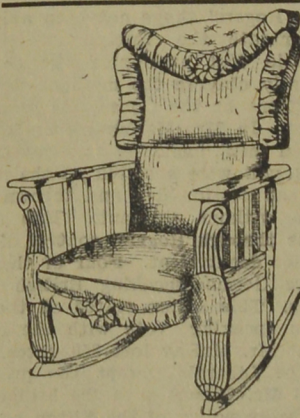

**STRAY TOPICS FROM
LITTLE OLD NEW YORK**

For the first time in his career as a public official Magistrate Levy was called upon to perform a marriage ceremony the other day. Although somewhat embarrassed, the magistrate went through the ceremony and after it was all over he congratulated himself upon the neatness with which he had officiated at his first marriage ceremony. There was a rather peculiar expression upon the faces of the principals and of the witnesses which led the inexperienced magistrate to inquire whether there had been anything amiss at the function. It is true, several jobs were offered to Graves, but owing to their nature he could not accept them in his crippled condition. One of the Y. M. C. A. branches offered him a position as errand boy for \$8 a week, which seems almost a mighty poor joke in view of the fact that it was clearly stated in the newspapers at the time that Graves found it difficult to move about even with the aid of crutches.
