meeting of the Police Commission
would be held today to investigate
the matter. It is understood that
the names of those who saw the in-
cident have been secured. The mayor
and Commissioner William McKay
consulted with one another at noon.

HAS BAD RECORD.

Chief of Police McCollom stated
this morning that Dugan belonged
to St. John and was an escaped
prisoner from the "chain gang" of
that city. For some three or four
years he has been living in Maine,
not going back to St. John. On for-
mer occasions when arrested by the
police he had made determined resis-
tance and altogether had a bad re-
cord.

HAS BUT ONE ARM.

Dugan has but one arm, the other
being cut off near the shoulder. He
is a man of very powerful physique,
however, and in the lumber woods is
known as being expert and as able
as a man with two arms. He arriv-
ed here Wednesday and has been ver-
noticeable about the city. Policeman
Solomon Brooks of the St. Mary's
Reserve, states that a man corres-
ponding in description to Dugan was
put off the reserve yesterday.

POLICEMAN'S CASE.

Chief McCollom, when asked if
Policeman Chapman was drunk last
night, would make no statement but
said the mayor was an eye-witness
of the affair. He also declined to say
whether or not Chapman would be on
duty tonight. Mayor Hooper also
declined to make a statement as to
whether or not Chapman was sus-
pended. There is great public inter-
est in the matter.

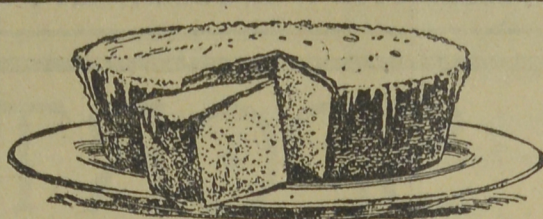

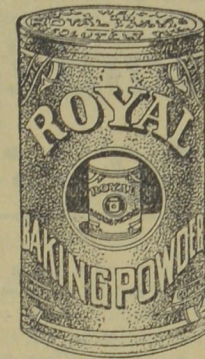

ad concerning it. Compulsory arbit-
ration had been successful in that it
had rendered the "sweating" sys-
tem impossible. But unfortunately
it had not made the workmen more
efficient. His wages had been increas-
ed and his hours of labor fixed, but
instead of increasing his productiv-
ness it had, in too many cases,
brought the better workman down to
the level of the medium man.

The problem of defence had been
based upon the necessity of the
protection of New Zealand's shores.
Australia more close to the menace
of hostility, had undertaken the
problem in a practical way and
strange as it might seem it was a
labor government that had institut-
ed the system of compulsory train-
ing.

New Zealand felt that her safety
also demanded it. Under the system
physical drill was taught in school
to boys between the ages of 14 and
18 years—the cadets age. At 18 the
cadets went to camp from 9 to 1
days. The scheme had been in op-
eration for two years and although at
first a certain element of the popu-
lation, notably the miners of the
west coast had resented compulsory
training, he had just received a let-
ter from the gen'l commanding the
forces stating that these very men
were among the most enthusiastic
in the service.

IMPERIAL DEFENCE.

Imperial defence was the problem
which New Zealand felt more forcibly
than other dominions because of its
lesser size. Canada, with its magni-
ficent extent of territory and possi-
bilities of great population, might
feel that some day it would want
to stand alone. New Zealand did not.
The Pacific Ocean was of as much
importance to England as was the
Atlantic, but such were the demands
upon the Mother Country for main-
tenance of home defence and protec-
tion of Atlantic trade routes that
Great Britain must have a very much
larger naval organization than she
has at present if imperial interests
were to be safeguarded on every sea.

"We cannot remain satisfied with
participation in a conference or or-
ganization that has no executive
functions," he said, "but it is only
an advisory body. We are no doubt
all looking forward to participation
in a more practical organization."
"This is the capital of the great
Dominion of Canada, of a territory
embracing more than half of the
North American continent, and we
look to the Canadian statesmen to
give us a lead."

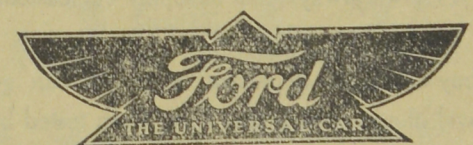
