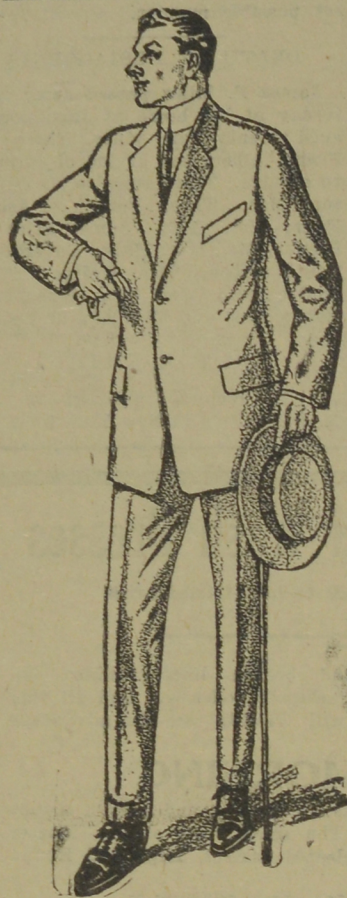

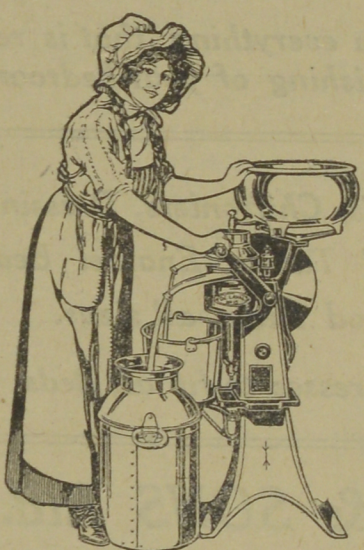

## KILBANE AND DUNDEE TO BE MATCHED AGAIN

Los Angeles, Cal., April 30—Negotiations were begun today for a return match between Johnny Kilbane, the featherweight champion, and Johnny Dundee, who fought a 10-round draw with him at Vernon last night. The contest last night was unsatisfactory in every way, according to the newspaper commentators today. Although Kilbane led easily on points, the draw decision was commended on the ground that Dundee was the aggressor and coming in at all times, albeit usually covered up.

Tom McCarrey and "Scotty" Monteth, manager of Dundee, expressed the hope of putting on the return match in two or three months, preferably July 4.

## COULON BEAT HUDSON

Windsor, Ont., April 30—Johnny Coulon of Chicago, champion bantamweight, tonight knocked out Tommy Hudson of Detroit in the fifth round of a scheduled eight-round bout.

The boys took matters easily for four rounds, neither landing any blows. Suddenly, in the fifth, Coulon shot left and right to the jaw and Hudson went out.

## CALAIS-ST. STEPHEN TO BE AT BIDDEFORD MAY 10 TO 17

Doyle Said to Have Line on Strong Team—McPherson Formerly of Biddeford Club Will Hold Down Third Base—Exhibition Games to be Played in Training

(Biddeford Times.)

The men who are to play under Ernie Doyle's management on the Calais-St. Stephen team in the New Brunswick and Maine League, will report in Biddeford for practice and will be here for a week or more, Doyle having secured Prospect Park from May 10th to 17th inclusive. The first of the bunch will be here on the 10th and the entire team will be on hand within a day or two afterwards.

Doyle will have enough men report for a tryout to pretty nearly make two teams and will arrange to have exhibition games played every day. These games will bring together some of the best young players in New England.

Doyle is at present getting the men for his team and is in correspondence with a number of crack players

whom he expects to land. He is determined to give Calais and St. Stephen a team the equal at least of any in the New Brunswick and Maine League, and from his experience in baseball and knowledge and acquaintance with players there is every reason to believe that he will have a team that will keep the others in the league busy during the season.

One of the men already signed by him is McPherson, who is now at Laconia, N.H., and who will be remembered by the fans as the fast third baseman who played under Doyle when the latter ran the game so successfully in this city several years ago.

As a third sack artist McPherson is a player with few equals in New England, and with a team composed of men of his class Doyle will certainly make Bangor, St. John and Fredericton go some.

## ::: SPORTS OF ALL KINDS :::

E. H. Greeley of Ellsworth, Me., the oldest man in the whole country to drive a race last year and who once owned Bingen, 2:06½, celebrated his eighty-first birthday recently.

John J. McGraw, manager of the New York Giants took charge of that team on July 19, 1902, being then a playing manager and acting as short stop, although he is better known as a third baseman? This game was against the Phillies, and the big crowd at the Polo grounds saw their team defeated by a score of 4 to 2. Iberg and Charley Doolin the present manager of the Philadelphia, were the batteries for that team, while the complete lineup of the New York was as follows:

Jones, left field; McGraw, shortstop; McGinn, first base; Brodie, centre field; Lauder, third base; Smith, second base; Washburn, right field; Bresnahan, catcher; McGinnity, pitcher.

That Charley Radbourne, the wonderful pitcher of the Providence team of the National League in 1884 won 26 victories out of 27 games, pitched from August 7 to September 18? Radbourne pitched 18 consecutive victories from August 7 to September 6, inclusive. He was then beaten 2-0 by Buffalo, although he only gave 5 hits. Then followed 8 more successive victories, or as before stated, 26 victories, in 27 games pitched in 42 days. Considering that Radbourne was pitching at the old 50 foot distance in a 6 x 4 box and that the batsman was allowed to call for a high or a low ball, and also that the fielders supporting him did not use the present day gloves, Radbourne's record must stand out as the most marvellous pitching performance in the history of baseball.

Letters have been received by the St. John management from McGovern, Winter, Dutton, Friar and other former players in the Marathons and other teams on the circuit last season saying that they would like to come back to play with the Greeks. It is possible that some of them may be signed, although in the case of Winter and Dutton their present contracts run to June 26 which may make it somewhat difficult. A new pitcher has been signed hailing from Haverstown, N. Y., and having a good name on the diamond. Noble of New London wants to come to St. John as first baseman. He stands 6 feet 1 inch high and is speedy.

George Stovall, first baseman and manager played his first game in the Big Show on July 4, 1904, covering first for Cleveland in a game with the Browns, the team he is now managing so successfully, and having this record: one run, one hit, seven put-outs, two assists and no errors.

Jos. B. Tinker, for many years an important factor in the famous Tinker to Evers to Chance combination, broke into the Big Leagues on April 17, 1902. His record at short for the Cubs in a game against Cincinnati which team he is managing this season, was as follows:—One run, one hit, two put-outs, two assists and no errors.

John J. Evers, known as the Keystone King or the Kranky Krah, now manager of the Chicago Cubs, broke in on September 1, 1902, covering short in a game against Philadelphia? He failed to make a hit off Guy Harris White, but accepted seven out of nine chances.

Charley Sweeney holds the individual strike-out record for a National League contest? The Californian struck out 19 of the Bostonians while pitching for Providence in a championship game in June 7, 1884, winning his game 2 to 1.

Joe McGinnity has been knocked out of the box in both his stunts for Tacoma in the Northwestern League. Vancouver hammered him for fourteen hits.

Paul Hines, of the Providence team of 1878; Harry O'Hagan, of the Uncheater team of 1902 and Neal Ball of the Cleveland team of 1909, completed the only single handed triple play on record.

"A Little Pep" Byron, who umpired in the International last year has got off to a good start in the National. He has already fired Manager Doolin of Philadelphia and Larry Doyle, captain of the New York Giants out of the game.

Johnny Evers sure has the laugh on his two old side-partners Tinker and Chance. While his Cubs are at the top of the National League race Chance's New York Americans and Tinker's Cincinnati bunch are at the bottom of the standing.

## HITCH OCCUR IN DEAL FOR RUDOLPH

New York, May 1—Geo. Stallings, manager of the Boston National League team, while admitting a trade was pending, declared that the report from Toronto that he had acquired Pitcher Rudolph of the International club in that city in exchange for Pitcher Brown and another consideration, was premature. The deal has been under way, he declared, but there is a hitch because of an intention Rudolph has expressed to go into business in New York.

## FIFTY DOLLARS FINE FOR TY COBB AS DISCIPLINE

Detroit's Hold-Out Reinstated in Organized Baseball—Clubs Notified That Commission Will Act

Chicago, May 1—Ty Cobb today was formally reinstated in organized baseball and fined \$50 by the National Baseball Commission. A decision by the commission given out in answer to the Detroit players appeal for reinstatement condemned Cobb severely for his action while "holding out."

The Detroit club was commended for its recent stand and censured for its passive policy regarding Cobb. Notice was served on other clubs that in case of their failure to discipline players whose actions are "detrimental to the game" the commission itself will act.

Earl has been a promoter of sports all his life and will make a valuable member of the club as he knows the sting of defeat and also knows what it feels like to win.
