It appearing to the Court that The Prudential Insurance Company of America has heretofore filed its duly verified petition, from which it appears that the said petitioner is a stock life insurance corporation, incorporated by the State of New Jersey and that the Board of Directors of said Company have determined that it would be conducive to the welfare of the corporation and in the interests of the policyholders thereof to change the corporation, from a stock life insurance corporation to a mutual life insurance corporation, and said corporation now applying to the Chancellor to appoint two or more disinterested persons to appraise the value of the capital stock of the said corporation and also to appoint one or more counsel to represent the policyholders before such appraisers and in such further proceedings as may be taken under or in pursuance of said petition.

A GOVERNMENT OF RESTRICTION

Dr. Michael Clark, summing up the closure debate last Wednesday night said:

"Look on this picture and on that, and you will know how to vote when your next chance to vote comes. The election cannot be postponed forever. NAVAL RESOURCES

(Continued from page one)

Germany and France are rivaling one another in their feverish efforts to increase their armed strength. Roughly speaking, Germany is aiming at a five million men standard for her army, but it is well known that a dependence upon numbers alone is not a failing of German military administrators, who are consistent in seeking, above all, to improve the quality and solidity of the first line. The increase in the German army of late has been such as to seriously threaten Great Britain's "60 per cent. superiority" standard. The salient feature in German naval progress is not so much the increase in size and power of every class of warship, although this has been most marked, but the further preparation for the immediate use of the whole of the effective fleet. Also to be reckoned is the German air fleet, admittedly the finest in the world.

France, impelled rather by the extraordinary acceleration of shipbuilding in Italy and Austria-Hungary, is making strenuous efforts to recover the ground lost in recent years. At the same time every possible increase in the French army which can be effected by financial and administrative methods is being made without delay.

Italy's navy is rapidly assuming respectable proportions. But the glory of Italy's armed forces is her cavalry. The peace footing is 245,000 but this can be raised in a week to 1,000,000 men. Austria-Hungary has recently passed laws which will much increase the military strength of the Dual Monarchy. Roughly speaking, the old organization produced about 1,214,000 trained men. The new laws will eventually raise this figure to 1,820,000.

The Russian army is the largest of all Europe and steps have been taken recently to further increase its size and efficiency. While there are continued signs of renewed activity in Russian naval construction, the acceleration in shipbuilding which is so noteworthy in Italy and Austria-Hungary has not been equalled. According to present plans the armies of the Central European Powers will be increased by 1,500,000 trained men before the end of the year. These additions are not considered excessive from the military point of view, because, apart from all other considerations, the Russian continent of recruits approximately equals that of Germany and Austria combined.

WAR SITUATIONS LOOKING BRIGHTER

London, May 1—At the ambassadors conference today it will be suggested that Antivari Montenegro and Dulcigno the Montenegrin seaports be occupied by Austrian, Italian and Bulgarian troops.

New York, May 1—F. Puttoun and Co. have received the following from Berlin. "Good news from Vienna," we consider this very reliable.

London, April 30—There is a general disposition on the part of the press today to regard the trouble with Montenegro and Austria's reported decision to act independently of the powers in driving the Montenegrins out of Scutari, as exceeding ly grave.

At the same time, as has been previously pointed out, there is no ground yet for serious alarm, for there is no official information that Austria has broken away from the European concert, and there still appears no reason why the powers should not be able to solve the problem before them.

The reports from Vienna are probably manufactured by the foreign office press bureau, carried on under the auspices of the heir apparent.

There is no doubt that King Nicholas has played his cards very cleverly though he may not be able to win as handsomely as he might have done had Scutari been captured and not surrendered as a result of bargaining with a treacherous commander.

From all over the country today there comes the demand that the proceedings of the committee conducting the Marconi inquiry shall be brought to an end to prevent further mischief. The notice of motion given in the house of commons last evening for June 2, has met with approval in the lobbies.

The Pall Mall Gazette says the committee has from the beginning been weak, rambling and dilatory, and that, as a tribunal, it has wholly failed in its main duty.

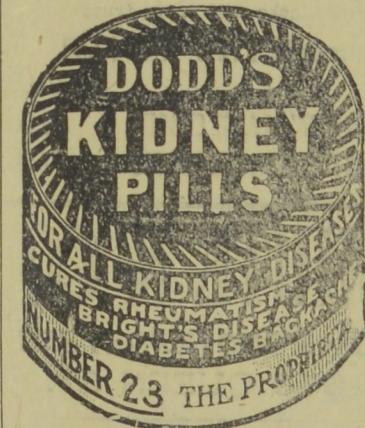
