FIRE STATION

Delegation Interviewed Fire Committee  
Last Night--Motor Construction  
Chemical Engine and Hose-Wagon  
Also Recommended

Underwriters President R. L. Ritchie and Secretary Peter Clinch of the New Brunswick Board of Fire Underwriters were here from St. John yesterday and last night waited upon the Fire Committee of the City Council to lay before that body certain requests.

The two matters which were particularly mentioned was the necessity for the erection of a new fire station to take the place of the present central station. A large station which would contain all the apparatus of the department was recommended Messrs Ritchie and Clinch also recommended a motor driven combination chemical engine and hose-wagon for the local department. This recommendation is along the line of that made by Chief H. C. Rutter in his annual report.

Ald. E. G. Hoben, chairman of the committee said that the matters referred to would be discussed by the committee at a meeting to be held in a few days.

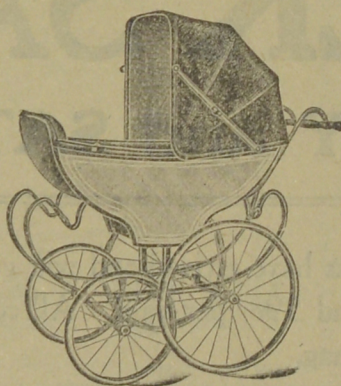

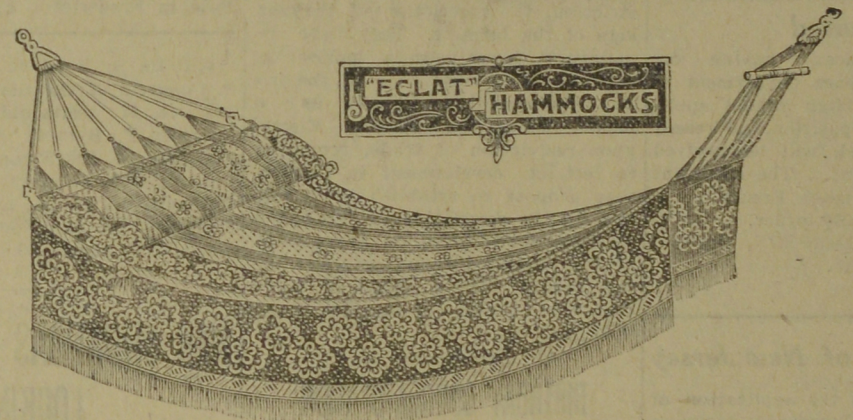
