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ATTACKS PROVINCIAL RIGHTS

When presenting his case for election in 1911, Mr. Borden declared that the Conservative party stood for "An unimpaired maintenance of all powers of self-government which have been conferred upon the provinces of Canada under the Constitution."

It was Mr. Borden who spent over \$50,000 trying to rob the provinces of their control of the marriage laws. It was Mr. Borden who tried to pass the Highways Aid Bill in such shape as to rob the provinces of their constitutional control of roads in spite of the protests of Premiers Walter Scott of Saskatchewan and Sir Lomer Gouin of Quebec.

It was Mr. Borden who insisted on passing the Aid to Agriculture Bill in such manner that it encroached right to control agricultural education upon the provinces' constitutional action.

It was Mr. Borden who sent his henchman, Hon. Robert Rogers to try and swing the Saskatchewan elections with promises of Dominion Government aid.

It was Mr. Borden who, through Hon. Mr. Rogers, interfered with the provincial by-election in Antigonish, N.S., with promises of public work.

Mr. Borden did not put any plank in his platform calling for fulfillment of pre-election promises. There was in ample reason for this omission.

DENIALS WERE FALSE

After systematic denials during last session that the Rainbow and Niobe were to be put out of business, the facts have gradually leaked out that after discouraging the Naval Service in every way, the Borden Government has offered the few men left on these two vessels their discharge, with a hint that they sooner they quit the better, a hint just taken by sixty of them.

With Mr. Borden thus carrying out the terms of his agreement with the Nationalist party, the Canadian Navy has reached a point where it could scarcely hurt even the tender susceptibilities of Mr. Bourassa. The "Navy" now chiefly consists of:

ANOTHER BROKEN PLEDGE

In his Halifax platform, Mr. Borden said: "We declared for re-organization of the present Railway Commission with wider powers and more extended jurisdiction so as to establish thorough and effective control over all corporations owning or operating public utilities or invested with franchises of a national character."

The Railway Commission was built up by the Laurier government. It is working today along the lines laid down by the Hon. Mr. Graham when Minister of Railways. It is conceded to be the most able and non-partisan body in Canada, as the poorest citizen can have any grievance remedied by merely writing a letter with a statement of his case to the Board.

In the dying days of last session of Parliament, Premier Borden insisted on presenting \$15,000,000 to the Canadian Northern Railway, but contemptuously refused the Liberal demand that in return for this huge gift the whole of that railway be brought within the jurisdiction of the Railway Commission.

About the same time, Premier Borden presented the Conservative Ontario government with \$2,000,000 as a subsidy for new branches to the Ontario Government Railway. When the Liberals pointed out that this road was destined to be an important feeder to the National Transcon-

tinental Railway, and demanded that the government have it brought within the Railway Commission jurisdiction in return for this \$2,000,000, as was the case with other Railways to which the Liberals gave subsidies, Mr. Borden promptly refused to consider any such thing. Instead of increasing the Railway Commission's control over the railways, Mr. Borden has decreased that control and transferred it to the government itself, with a system of mutual favors at the public expense.

As vote getters for the Liberal cause the so called "ticket agent" on the I.R.C. trains who are familiarly known as "Brady's Pets" are doing much better work than is being done by Hon. Frank Cochrane, Minister of Railways. These men, who owe their positions to political pull, are being paid \$100 per month each for doing work which the conductors should do.

LIVELY RUNAWAY IN KING STREET THIS MORNING

A horse attached to a Dominion Express Company's wagon, while standing in front of the Smith Foundry, King Street, this morning at 9.45, became frightened by a motor-car and ran away up King Street. In front of W. A. Lindsay's restaurant the express wagon collided with the farm wagon of Ex-Coun. Chesley Hallett of Bear Island. Mr. Hallett's load of provisions was upset and the wagon badly smashed. The driver sustained a bruised arm and leg and his team of horses ran through the Commercial Hotel yard and were finally captured on Queen Street by Police Commissioner McKay. In King Street a delivery wagon of Yerxa & Co. was also struck and damaged by the Dominion Express wagon which sustained a damaged rear axle and the runaway horse some cuts. After the runaway was over the express company's horse backed on top of a sulky in which Trainer William Sharon was driving one of A. E. Trites' horses. A wheel of the sulky was smashed. This is not the first time this Dominion Express Company's horse has run away.

A number of yachts belonging to the Kennebecasis fleet, now cruising on the river, arrived in port this afternoon and anchored off the clubhouse. A delegation of local mariners met them at Oromocto in Commodore Chestnut's launch Viking. This evening there will be a band concert and smoker in honor of the visitors.
