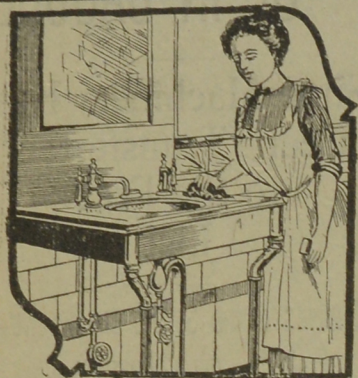

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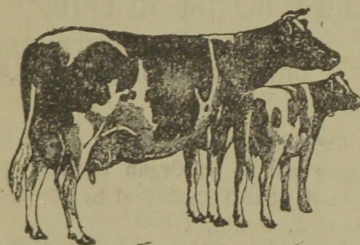

Some repairs will be made on the boat and she will be ready to go upon the route as soon as navigation opens. 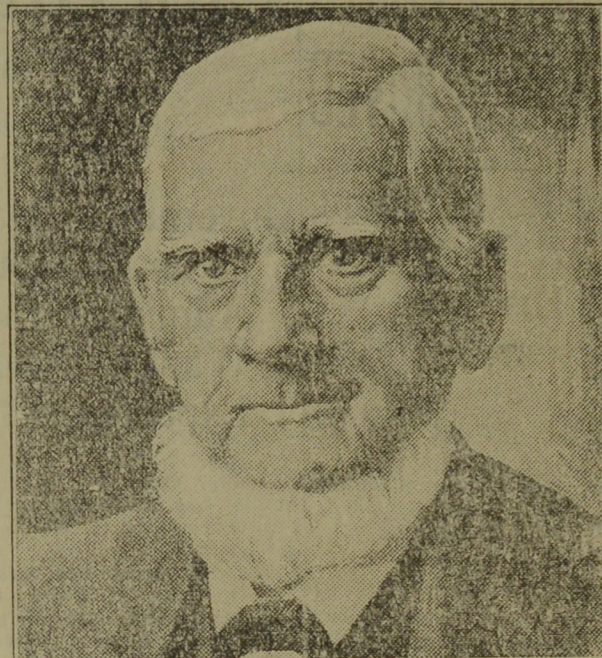
