PRESS COMMENT ON THE CLOSURE BILL

London, Eng., April 10—London papers are handling the Canadian situation with caution and reserve. The Times, while printing two columns from its Toronto correspondent, strongly taking the government's side, makes no editorial comment.

The Pall Mall Gazette treats the debate as the principal item of the day's news, describing it as the greatest party struggle in the history of the dominion and deploring that a great party conflict should have come on an issue so important to imperial interests.

The Daily News says editorially: "It is hardly a pleasant anxiety for the promotion of imperial unity when the first result of the proposed contribution is to provoke a domestic crisis of the most acute description. It is clear that the more it is discussed the more the advantages of Laurier's alternative are approved in Canada. It avoids the constitutional problem both here and in the dominion. Borden's plan weakens the already imperfect control of the British parliament over armaments and withdraws from Canadians the management of their own ships."

"Obviously, there is no element of permanence here, but rather an ample promise of these future opportunities for friction which all wise statesmanship seeks to avoid."

CANADIAN COMMENT

Toronto, April 10—Commenting on yesterday's proceedings in the House of Commons, the Globe says:

"There is no longer a pretense of fair play in the parliament of Canada. That the revered chief of the Liberal party, a statesman of world wide reputation, whose parliamentary methods have always been most courteous and considerate should be howled down in the commons by a mob of opponents after the speaker had signified that he had the floor is a black ugly stain upon every man who took part in the infamous affair, from Premier Borden down."

SENATE MUST KILL NAVAL BILL

Ottawa, April 10—The Citizen (Con.), says:

"If the naval bill is put through by closure methods, with the Liberals fighting bitterly, for what many will consider the privilege of free speech and minority rights the principal effect it will have will be to give the senate new reason for existence and for exercising the veto power for which it was originally intended."

"The closure (means) a dangerous revolt on in Canadian parliamentary methods. It perils are clearly apparent to both parties alike. It might develop into a tool which in the hands of a less scrupulous government would expose the country principal effect it will have will be to mercenary aims. Even though it is the only way remaining whereby the majority may enact particular legislation according to its will and desire, the permanent perils are greater than the immediate need."

MINISTERS TO LOSE MARRIAGE FEES

Windsor, Ont., April 10—Alarmed at the prospect of the new Marriage Bill passing the Legislature and imposing a residence that will wipe out Windsor's Gretna Green, The Rev. W. E. Prescott, pastor of Bathurst Street Church, Toronto, informed Mr. N. J. Clinton, recording steward that without fees for performing marriages he did not feel inclined to come to Windsor at the salary of \$1,600 agreed upon at the time of accepting the call to succeed the Rev. F. W. Hollinrake.

A special meeting of the Church Board was held and a resolution passed to raise Mr. Prescott's salary to \$1,800 as partial recompense for the anticipated loss of revenue in marriage fees when the Hon. Mr. Hanna's Bill comes into effect.

There are upwards of 3,500 marriages performed each year in Windsor, Walkerville and Sandwich. The bulk of the weddings come from the neighboring States of Michigan, Ohio and Indiana. The residence clause will kill the "foreign trade" and estimates of the "loss" are being made up.

The marriage license issuers receive two dollars as the usual fee which means \$180 as profit.

On basis of 2,500 weddings from across the boundary the yearly loss to issuers will be \$4,500.

The officiating clergyman generally receive \$5 as their fee which would mean a loss of \$12,500 in income.

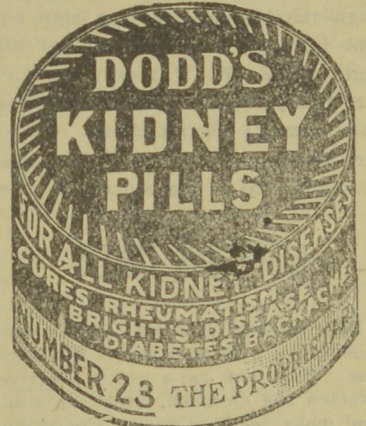

The late Mr. Tait was taken ill last fall and spent the late autumn and winter at St. Agathe, Quebec, until about a month ago when a change for the worse was manifested and necessitated his being removed to Montreal. Since then he had been confined to bed at his home 134 Crescent Street.

The late Mr. Tait though only 24 years of age was well known in business circles. He has been associated with the bank of Montreal for the last six years, and while there was a prominent member of the Bank hockey league figuring in three championship aggregations.

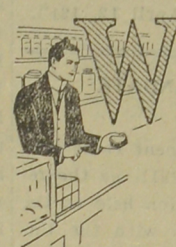
He was also a swimmer of note. Many prizes, medals and trophies were awarded to him in the M.A.A.A. competitions of which association he was an active member for years.

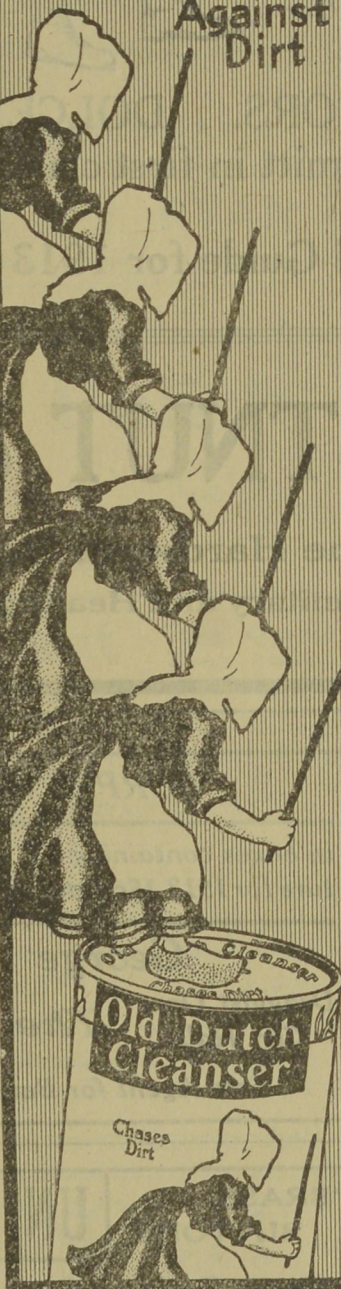
