## BAN JOHNSON ISSUES DEFI TO PLAYERS' FRATERNITY

Umpires Do Not Exaggerate in Report-  
ing Cases of Discipline Says  
American League President

Chicago, April 10.—"There will be  
no departure from the custom of  
handling players who come under the  
ban of umpires and league presi-  
dents," B. B. Johnson, president of  
the American League, asserted last  
night, after receiving a letter from  
David Fultz, head of the Baseball  
Players' Fraternity. Mr. Fultz re-  
quested that players be given a hear-  
ing before being suspended or fined.

"The present system is the only  
possible one by which baseball can  
be conducted successfully," said  
President Johnson. "The umpires  
are our personal representatives on  
the diamond and their word must  
carry weight. We brought baseball  
out of chaos by the adoption of the  
present rules and there is no reason  
for a change."

"The Players' Fraternity asks that  
the player be permitted to present  
his side of an argument. This right  
is not denied a man now, but I am  
sure that no empire exaggerates a  
case in his report. In such an in-  
stance I would not hesitate to dis-  
charge the umpire."

"If the public or all of the big  
league players could see all the re-  
ports of cases of misconduct it would  
be seen the player usually is the of-  
fender. Nine-tenths of these cases  
are of players using unprintable lan-  
guage. If there is excuse for such  
the players are welcome to consult  
me by mail or personally. I believe  
that President Lynch of the National  
League will see the necessity of vest-  
ing umpires with supreme author-  
ity."

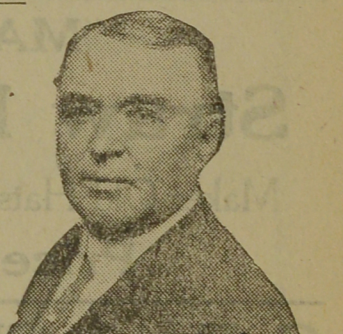

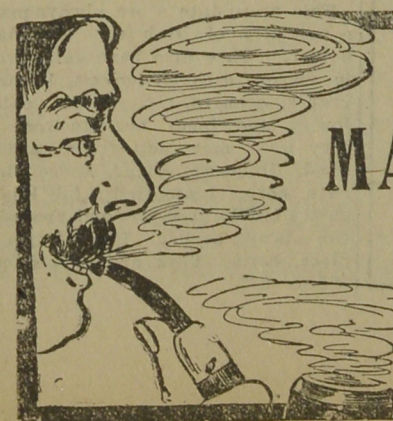
