THE BOARD OF TRADE

The annual meeting of the Board of trade last evening was well attended, and a report of the proceedings which will be found in another part of this issue, particularly the address of President Jennings makes very interesting reading. The officers and several committees of the board were very active during the year and their work was productive of very satisfactory results. The Board of Trade is composed of wide awake business men and they are working with a common purpose in view—the advancement of Fredericton. A good, live Board of Trade can do much to promote the material prosperity of the community. The Fredericton board has already done much and it can do more if citizens generally give it a united and whole hearted support.

Fredericton possesses many advantages as a manufacturing and distributing centre and the completion of the two lines of railway, now under construction will greatly improve its position. We want more industries, but in these days of keen competition we cannot afford to sit down and wait for them to come along. We can scarcely expect outsiders to invest their capital in Fredericton industries unless our own people of means are willing to prove their faith in the possibilities of the city by more than the word of mouth.

The year just closed has been a fairly prosperous one, the outlook for the future is much brighter. The spirit of hopefulness prevails in the community and there is no reason why the year upon which we have embarked should not be a record breaker. Forward, Fredericton, should be the watch word during 1913.

A DROP IN THE BUCKET

During seven years of Liberal administration in England the British national debt has been reduced by £63,000,000 according to a statement recently made by Lloyd George, the Chancellor of the Exchequer, in the British House of Commons. This means a reduction of debt of about \$45,000,000 a year, or \$10,000,000 a year more than the Borden "emergency" donation. In addition to this during the past three years the British Government has provided for an extra expenditure of £13,500,000 on the navy, over and above the ordinary program of shipbuilding, dock construction, etc.—an extra expenditure in three years of \$67,500,000, or almost twice the amount of the Borden gift, which will take, at least, three years to turn into ships. And during the same time the British Government has paid its enormous naval expenditure completely out of current revenue, while the other European nations, and notably Germany, have financed their armament creation out of loans.

Canada's thirty-five millions will not cut a very imposing figure beside these huge sums, but even that will have to be financed by a loan, because even if for the sake of political effect it may be taken out of revenue, it will mean that the government must increase its borrowing in other directions so that the result will be the same. The \$35,000,000 will be borrowed in England, a cheque handed over to the British Admiralty, and then be followed by yearly tribute of interest to English capitalists.

If there is such an emergency that Mr. Borden must rush to borrow \$35,000,000 to save the Empire, how is it that the British Government has not also discovered the emergency, and instead of using its immense surplus funds to meet it goes steadily along using the money to pay off debts while as steadily continuing its permanent naval policy?

The more this emergency talk is analyzed the more palpable is the truth of Sir Wilfrid Laurier's statement in Parliament that the Empire has not to face an emergency but a permanent condition. Sir Wilfrid poses to join in facing that condition

along British lines by creating a new force—a Canadian navy of real effective value. Mr. Borden proposes to ignore the condition and defer his Cabinet troubles by emphasizing an old Tory condition—increased in Canada's national debt.

Some of the more superstitious M.P.'s who have been elected to support Premier Flemming, will scarcely relish the idea of the legislature being summoned to meet for the despatch of business on the 13th of February, 1913.

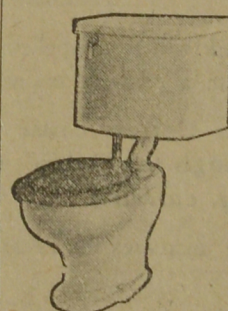
