up.

Mr. Weddall nominated Mr. J. D. Palmer as president. Mr. Palmer although urged by several members to accept nomination stated that on account of pressure of business he could not accept.

Mr. Hodge nominated Mr. W. G. Clark who also declined.

Mr. Dibble drew attention to the fact that it was customary to nominate the vice-president for the higher office. Was there any by-law preventing a legal gentleman from being president?

Vice-President Slipp explained that though there was no rule to the effect that a merchant or manufacturer should be president the board primarily was a business man's organization.

Mr. Farrell nominated President Jennings for a third term in the course of some remarks very complimentary to that gentleman.

Mr. Jennings asked to be relieved of the duties of the office. Mr. Slipp pressed him to accept and by a unanimous vote he was elected.

President Jennings briefly thanked the members for the honor conferred upon him.

The other officers were elected.

TELEPHONE COMPANY'S PETITION

Secretary Campbell read to the board the petition of the New Brunswick Telephone Company concerning its proposed classification of telephone services and rates, which is to be presented to the Board of Trade tomorrow. Special committee composed of Messrs. W. W. Hubbard, Howard Rogers and R. G. Lee was appointed to take up matter and reported back to the board action on the report being taken as mentioned before.

Secretary Campbell read also the memorial of the Winnipeg Board of Trade favoring reciprocal demurrage which is to be laid before the Railway Commission.

On the motion of Mr. W. G. Clark the board endorsed the memorial.

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS CONSIDERED

The address of President Jennings was taken up section by section.

Speaking to the section urging that the annual dinner of the board be held early in the year, Mr. Hodge moved that the annual dinner be held and suggested that Hon. R. L. Borden, premier of Canada be asked to address the board on that occasion.

The motion was carried and Messrs. J. D. Palmer, A. R. Slipp, G. Y. Dibble and C. C. Jones were appointed a committee to take charge of the matter.

The section dealing with Publicity work during the year was referred to the council of the Board. Speaking to the section President Jennings and Messrs. Slipp and Dibble complimented Publicity Commissioner McDade upon the success which had attended his efforts.

The section dealing with the Immigration Congress and the visit of the British Manufacturers were adopted and referred to the council.

Messrs. Campbell and Dibble strongly supported the section recommending that a permanent office be furnished the Board of Trade. The section was referred to the council.

On the motion of Mr. Hodge it was decided that the executive take up the matter of printing the annual report of the board.

The section re a union station was referred to the Transportation Committee with instructions to continue the agitation.

The report as a whole was adopted. A formal resolution of thanks for assistance in various ways was tendered the City Council on the motion of Mr. Slipp.

The board then adjourned.

A Union Station is most essential and steps might well be taken by the Board to endeavor to have the various railways take up this matter with a view to providing such a station and also the necessary terminal facilities.

Early in the summer your Committee interviewed Mr. McNicol and Mr. Leonard of the Canadian Pacific Railway and pointed out to them the need of improving their local facilities.

Your Committee through its Secretary, Mr. George Y. Dibble has taken up several transportation matters affecting this city.

FREIGHT RATES ON COAL.

The matter of the excessive freight rates from Moncton and Chipman to Fredericton via McGivney Junction, was taken up and your committee has received assurances from Mr. D. McPherson of the N.T.R. Commission, that the rates from Chipman to McGivney's would be cut in two while Mr. McPherson further assured our committee that he was negotiating with the N. B. Coal & Railway Company to also reduce their rates from Minto to Chipman, which are now excessive. The matter was also

taken up with Mr. A. W. Campbell, of the Government Railways Managing Board.

Your committee has advocated closer connection of trains on the N.T.R. with the I.C.R. at McGivney Junction and are assured that steps will be taken to bring about the desired change in the time table.

Among other matters your committee took up the improvement of the first class car equipment on the Canada Eastern branch of the Intercolonial Railway and have been informed by General Superintendent Brady that better accommodation will be provided.

Your committee desires to thank Mr. O. S. Crockett, M.P., for his cordial assistance in many of these matters and have also to express their thanks to the various railway officials for courtesies extended.

HEATED CARS TAKEN OFF.

Your committee regrets that the C.P.R. has increased the freight rates in winter over the charges in the summer and in addition have taken off their heater car service, which service has been given for the past several years. Your committee can find no reason for discounting this service; there is nothing in the orders issued by the Railway Commission of Canada to prevent the company operating the service as heretofore. Their action in withdrawing the service means a further increase in the freight rates to merchants who have to import perishable goods during the winter.

Your committee has made arrangements to hold the Fredericton Express for fifty minutes at Fredericton Junction to connect with the Montreal Express, leaving St. John at 5.50 o'clock p.m.

Mr. J. W. McCready, as president of the Fredericton Tourist Association, reported as follows:

To the President and Members of the Fredericton Board of Trade:

Gentlemen:—I present herewith for your information the annual report of your Tourist Committee.

During the year the seventh edition of the committee's booklet became exhausted and an eighth edition of 10,000 copies is now being circulated. The attractions of the province, chiefly from the tourist and sportsman's standpoint, have been advertised in fourteen publications during the year and also by specially prepared articles, which appeared in a number of leading journals in Canada, the United States and Great Britain.

Our booklets were distributed at the New York Sportsmen's Show and at the Oddfellows' Convention at Winnipeg and to the members of the Railway Ticket Association at Ottawa and were also handled by some fifteen transportation and tourist distributing offices throughout Canada and the United States. In addition about 800 copies of the booklet were mailed in answer to applications for same and 1,000 others were mailed to particular addresses throughout the United States, Canada and Great Britain.

The association has had correspondence from Peru, Guatemala and Guayaquil in South America, Manila and Calcutta, and from a large number of the United States and for the first time have received a number of letters from Ontario and the Canadian West.

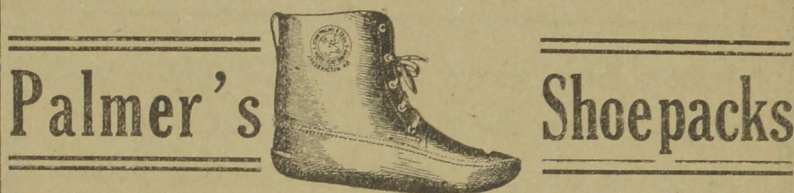
