### NORMAL SCHOOL

(Continued from page 1)

probably was without parallel in the history of the institution, and was remarkable considering the circumstances.

CHIEF SUPT. OF EDUCATION.

Dr. Carter presented the Governor General's Silver Medal to Fred C. Manning for highest professional standing in Class A. He had expected to present a medal to a young woman and it was almost unprecedented that both medals had been won by young men. He had had the pleasure of being a neighbor of Mr. Manning during school life at least. His grandfather had rendered important service to the Province of New Brunswick.

Continuing, Dr. Carter said that the province and its people were on the eve of tremendous development and expansion in education. The time would never come when the "three R's" would not be in demand and he trusted that there always would be young men and women to take literary training in the Arts courses of our universities. There was however, an increasing demand for vocational education. All had noticed the advances made in agricultural education and only the day before the report of the Technical Education Commission had been published. There was a demand for the utilitarian.

Principal Bridges had mentioned the expansion to take place in the Normal School and the increased accommodation which would be provided. He hoped that it would prove adequate. He congratulated students and instructors on the excellence of the program and expressed the best wishes for the future of the students who were about to leave the institution.

Principal Bridges then introduced Hon. H. F. McLeod, Provincial Secretary, who would present the Governor General's Bronze Medal to Elmer C. Close of Keswick Ridge. Dr. Bridges referred to the fact that Mr. Close was a York County boy. York County had sent many students to the Provincial Normal School and never more than in 1912 and 1913.

Hon. Mr. McLeod in presenting the medal to Mr. Close said amid applause that the gentlemen students at the Normal School in winning both medals at last had realized their proper position. He was particularly pleased that Mr. Close was a York County boy for York was the best county of the province (Hear! Hear!) The Provincial Secretary became reminiscent and referred to the days when he was a student at the Fredericton High School when Dr. George R. Parkin was principal. At that time the school at Keswick Ridge was sending students to the High School and thence to the University of New Brunswick and that although situated in a not thickly settled district.

Dr. Carter had referred to the fact that there was an ever increasing demand for that utilitarian in education. Personally he hoped that there always would be those whose inclination would be toward the liberal arts and a liberal education.

Principal Bridges then explained it had been customary for an address to be delivered to the students by a member of the provincial government. Hon. Dr. Landry, minister of agriculture, one of the most brilliant Acadian graduates of St. Joseph College had been expected to deliver that address. Unfortunately two days before he had informed the speaker that he would be unable to be present. However Dr. W. C. Kierstead of the U. N. B. faculty, a graduate of the Normal School had consented to deliver the address.

Prior to delivering his message to the graduating Class Dr. Kierstead referred to the equipment of the Normal School and the members of its staff. Mention had been made of the fact that improvements were to be made at the institution but he could say that never had the school better instructors or better equipment than at the present time. The speaker then gave some words of advice to the graduates. He urged strongly the need of self-realization and social service. He also urged ambition and drew attention to the fact that it was not always the medallists and prize-winners who succeeded in after-life. Education meant the development of society and true social service could be attained without high ideals.
