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CONTEMPT OF PARLIAMENT

During its brief period of office the Borden government has shown an unflinching determination to enforce the time disgraced system of government by Cabinet rather than by Parliament, which would alone warrant the people in contemptuously dismissing it from power whenever it dare give them the chance. Its course has been evidently promoted, not merely by a desire for absolute power, but by the desire to obtain absolute control of immense funds, with the clear intention of using them in such a manner as to off-set the effect of its record.

Mr. Borden tried to secure a vote of \$35,000,000 to buy warships with. He insisted that every cent of that \$35,000,000 should be voted to the absolute control of the government so that it could be expended by the government without the slightest control by parliament, even though the expenditure had to continue over four or five years, as it would. When on May 15th, Mr. W. M. German moved that the \$35,000,000 be paid.

Upon appropriation in that behalf being from time to time made by parliament, the Tories and Nationalists united to defeat it. When Mr. Carvell moved that the work done under the proposed Act should be by contract awarded upon public tenders, the Tories and Nationalists voted it down. When the Senate demanded the cool judgment of the people upon the project, the government refused to take such a risk and abandoned the bill.

The whole course of the Naval Bill made it plain that the Borden-Rogers combination were far more anxious to gain absolute control of the \$35,000,000 (and the further funds that would inevitably be needed) than they were to aid Great Britain. Recent revelations of the machinations of the armament trust and the presence of their agents at Ottawa during the debate shows what would have happened had Mr. Borden won. Ten per cent. of \$35,000,000 is \$3,500,000 and a ten per cent. rake off is by no means a stranger to the armament trust.

PLAYING THE GAME

Col. the Hon. Sam Hughes, who was in Fredericton this week, inspected a militia camp at St. Irene, P. Q., on Sunday and afterwards attended Mass. Press despatches tell us "that he stood at attention during the whole service which was military in its significance." The despatches also tell us that Col. Sam was entertained at luncheon by Sir Rodolphe Forget at his home and that the list of guests included l'Abbe Paquette, Quare; l'Abbe Deschamps, Montreal, and l'Abbe Tremblay, St. Agnes. But this is not all. The despatches to the Montreal Star further tell us that "in the course of the speeches made both Sir Ian Hamilton and the Minister of Militia replied in French. "Ye gods and little fishes! Think of Col. Sam attending mass, dining with l'Abbes and making a speech in French all in one day. No wonder that great champion of the Protestant faith, Mr. Adolphus Duncan Thomas, was not on hand to extend the glad hand to Col. Sam at McGivney Junction. Nevertheless the man who claims to hold eighteen hundred Orange votes in the palm of his hand was there. The Mail does not object to Col. Sam attending mass, dining with l'Abbes or making a speech in French but it does object most decidedly to the bare faced hypocrisy being practised on the people of certain rural districts of this county by men high up in the councils of the Tory party, who profess great love for the principles of the Orange order. Those who cannot see through the little game being worked by these men deserve to be classified as blind fools.

There was such an exodus of colonels and majors from the city on Monday that business in the police court was tied up.

The Earl of Minto, former Governor-General of Canada, was born July 9, 1847, sixty-six years ago today, and succeeded to the title upon the death of his father in 1891. After completing his education at Cambridge he began his military career as an ensign in the Scots Guards. He served with the Turkish army in 1877 and two years later participated in the Afghan war. In 1881 he was in South Africa, serving as secretary to Lord Roberts, and the following year he took part in the Egyptian campaign. In 1883 he first came to Canada as military secretary to the Governor-General, the Marquis of Lansdowne. During the Northwest rebellion of 1885 he served as chief of staff. In 1898 the Earl returned to Canada as Governor-General, in which position he served for six years. Later he served for several years as Governor-General of India.

At the recent Niagara Military camp only 52 men of Toronto's crack regiment, the Royal Grenadiers, turned out for training. The Toronto News, which led the campaign for Mr. Borden's \$35,000,000 contribution to the British Navy apologizes for this by saying—"The members of the city regiments are nearly all holding good positions, and cannot leave for the week without forfeiting their pay." "Oh ye Tory jingoes." Plenty of money to pay, but not a man to fight. It is evident that Toryism in the militia is as anxious not to man our Canadian regiments for fighting purposes as it is determined not to man or maintain Canadian battle-ships.

The Chatham World—"Hon. J. D. Hazen, in replying to protests against abandoning the Chelmsford section of the Canada Eastern, promises to give the protests 'all possible consideration.' The thing for him to do, as the representative of New Brunswick in the Cabinet, is to put his foot squarely down and prevent the robbery. He can do it if he will."

What's the use of the Commodore wasting his time appealing to a man whom he once described as "a weak-kneed, back boneless leader." Mr. Cochrane has decided to tear up the rails and that settles it. The only thing for the Commodore to do is to withdraw his support from the Tory party.

The Tories in the Imperial House of Commons, true to the traditions of their party, are fighting against the one man, one vote bill introduced by the Asquith Government. At one time the Tory aristocracy of Great Britain controlled two thirds of the House of Commons but that day has gone past. Should they be deprived of the special privilege which they now enjoy of voting in two or three constituencies it will be goodbye to Toryism in Great Britain for years to come.

Mr. O. S. Crockett, M.P., who is slated for a seat on the Supreme Court bench is certainly a man of rare discernment. If proof of this were wanting it was furnished by the party of representative citizens whom he invited to travel at the public expense to McGivney Junction on Monday to meet General Sir Ian Hamilton and the Minister of Militia and Defence. They all came in for a free trip over the government railway and a free lunch.

The Irish Home Rule Bill passed its third reading in the House of Commons on Monday. It will now go to the House of Lords and will be rejected by that body. It will pass the House of Commons again in 1914 and will automatically become law under the Parliament bill passed a few years ago.

MINIMUM SALARY \$900

It was decided at the recent session of the mission board of the Anglican diocese of Fredericton to increase the stipends of all the mission clergy throughout the province if it was found possible to raise funds for this purpose. At present there are many missionaries receiving a stipend of \$800, but the mission board has come to the conclusion that a minimum of \$900 should be paid, though it has not yet been ascertained that this will be possible.
