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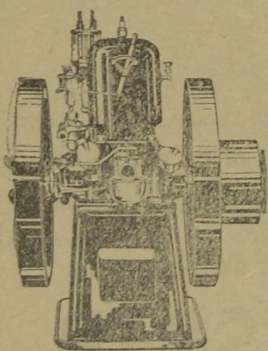
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## DAVE MOREY WORKING OUT IN ATHLETICS' UNIFORM

Connie Mack of the Philadelphia Athletics appears to be sweet on Bay State school and college ball players judging by the number he has signed in recent years.

Dave Morey of Malden, Cawley of Lowell and George Brickley of Everett are his three latest acquisitions. Morey and Cawley have already joined the team, but Brickley is not expected to report until September.

Morey and Cawley were at Fenway Park in Philadelphia uniforms yesterday working out. The former started his career at Malden High School where he pitched and played the outfield for four years. He entered Dartmouth, and signed with the Athletics when he graduated last June.

During Morey's career with the Green he pitched mighty good ball. He scored victories over many of the big college and university teams but lost an 11-inning game to Yale by a margin of one run. Next year he will coach the Dartmouth Freshman football team.

Cawley has been prominent at Lowell High for the last four years. He played shortstop and is regarded as one of the best schoolboy players developed of late years. Throughout his career he has had a reputation as a hitter.

## ST. JOHN THREATENS TO SUSPEND HARRINGTON

(St. John Times, Tuesday)  
The announcement that J. E. Harrington, a new pitcher for the Marathons was on his way to St. John, now appears to be premature. Transportation had been arranged for him by the local management. He has been playing at Bellows Falls, Vt., and it was expected that he would have been here before this. Today F. J. Leonard, manager of the team, received a letter from him stating that, owing to a collision at second base, he would probably be out of the game for a while, as pleurisy was feared. Physicians, he said, had advised him that he would be in shape to pitch for about a month, and therefore he would not be coming to St. John.

Mr. Leonard wrote him reminding him that he had signed a contract and was to leave for here on June 25 and that transportation had been arranged for that date. Afterwards arrangements had been made for his coming later. He had been expected to leave yesterday, and he added a line to the effect that this same second base trouble had been given as an excuse for not coming two years ago. The manager told that he must either report before July 14 or be placed under suspension according to the rules of organized baseball.
