FOUR DIVORCE CASES GO OVER TO OCTOBER TERM

Case of Hawthorne vs Hawthorne Heard This Morning—Leaman Case Finished Yesterday Afternoon—Burton Case Open

Four divorce cases will go over from the present sitting of the Divorce Court until the October sitting. One more case that of Astles vs Astles being stood over today at the request of P. A. Guthrie counsel of the plaintiff. The other cases which go over are King vs King and Durning vs. Durning.

The case of Lillie F. Hawthorne vs Wm. H. Hawthorne was heard this morning for the plaintiff. The witnesses examined were the plaintiff, the mother of the plaintiff, R. W. Tibbitts deputy provincial secretary and the co-respondent infidelity is the ground alleged for divorce. Court considers.
