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A DISCREDITED CABINET

Mr. Borden, previous to his election in 1911, declared: "You have my pledge that any administration I am called upon to form shall be so constituted that it shall not be unworthy of the great country which it is to serve."

In October, 1911, Mr. Borden formed his ministry. Its leader was the Hon. Robert Rogers, the man who won fame by his remarkable knowledge of the art of winning elections by "human methods." There was the Hon. Dr. Reid, who was connected with the Prescott Starch Works, a losing venture, from which he withdrew in January and whose property was speedily sold in March to the government for \$47,500. There were three Nationalist ministers who were fresh from Quebec province where they had won their campaign by denunciation of "The nefarious policy of Mr. Borden." Later on came the Hon. Louis Coderre, also a Nationalist, and accused of conniving at systematic personation, an accusation under which he has been content to lie for four months.

Small wonder that the Conservative Orangeville Sun, says:

"As a Conservative journal we cannot applaud the Borden Government's gift of \$15,000,000 to Mackenzie and Mann. There are some men in the Cabinet who do not command public confidence and their actions are looked on with suspicion. The fact of the matter is, the Government is throwing away altogether too much money and the people will not stand for it very long. Mr. Borden would do well if he secured a few men in whom the public had full confidence. The farmers of Dufferin Co. are unanimous against making enormous grants to railways."

The Winnipeg Tribune, (Ind.) says: "It appears certain that the interests selected several of Mr. Borden's cabinet, and in the last two sessions we have had the product of their labors. Wholly discreditable in many respects to Mr. Borden, and regretfully noted it may be said, by a section of the Conservative press, a great host of Conservatives and by the people generally."

St. John Times:—A supporter of the Flemming government made the remark the other day that bad roads had defeated the old provincial government, and would probably defeat its successor, for the present government had failed utterly to carry out a satisfactory policy with regard to the highways. It will probably be found before the present legislative term ends that the government, which began the term with practically no opposition, will have developed a very formidable opposition within its own ranks.

According to a Tory newspaper Mr. Gutellus during his recent visit to Fredericton "tabooed" the galvanized iron culverts being laid by the contractors on the St. John Valley Railway. This means that the culverts will have to be taken out and replaced by concrete. Evidence is coming to hand almost daily in co-operation of the statement made in Parliament by Mr. F. B. Carvell, M. P. that the company is building a road that will cost considerably less than the Dominion and Provincial subsidies.

"I am a Canadian, and a descendant of the United Empire Loyalists, and I am, as all Canadians must be proud of the British Empire; but it will never be held together by her Colonies paying tribute. We must build for ourselves, and relieve the Mother Country of that expense in whatever way we can best help her." So writes F. E. Wager, of Eastbrook Saskatchewan, to a Winnipeg newspaper.

Hon. H. F. McLeod's failure to reach Chatham on the 12th inst., may militate against his chances of landing the portfolio of Attorney General.

The members of the Board of Trade and citizens generally were delighted to hear that the C.P.R. authorities had decided to send Mr. Charles B. Foster assistant (passenger traffic manager of the eastern lines to this city, to discuss passenger rates, with a view of removing a cause for complaint which now exists. Mr. Foster is a native of King's County and was for some years district passenger agent at St. John before being called upon to fill higher positions in the west. He thoroughly understands conditions in New Brunswick and if he is given anything like a free hand there is not the slightest doubt but that discriminating passenger rates against Fredericton will soon be a thing of the past.

It is said that Mr. W. H. Thorne of St. John who has long been the "boss" of the Tory party in this province will get the seat in the Senate vacated by the death of Hon. J. V. Ellis. An Ottawa despatch says that Mr. Thorne will accompany Hon. Mr. Hazen on a trip to the Pacific Coast. The name of Mr. R. D. Wilmet, ex-M.P. for Sunbury, Queens, has been mentioned, and while his appointment would give satisfaction to a great many people, it does not look as if he was in the running.

Should Mr. Pinder decide to take the portfolio of Public Works in lieu of a seat in the Federal Parliament a shake up among the officials of his department would seem to be in order. The old war horse of the Naskawick was turned down once but this time he is going to demand delivery of the goods. He is either going to be an M. P. or a provincial minister.

While on his triumphal tour of Canada, with his equestrians, A.D.C.'s, led captains, valets, servants and press agents, etc., Col. the Hon. Sam Hughes was mistaken for a prince at St. Irene's by a French-Canadian youth. When the bills for Col. Hughes' trip come in, it is not unlikely that a real prince would be cheap compared with "The Colonel."

After the Montreal Herald has at last come out into the open as owned and controlled by Conservative interests, will the Tory Press throughout Canada continue to quote it as "The leading Quebec Liberal organ?" This game was worked hard for a time, but apparently it has been played out.

A great many Tory politicians loomed up as Twelfth of July orators in Ontario, but they appear to have maintained a discreet silence in regard to the ne temere decree.

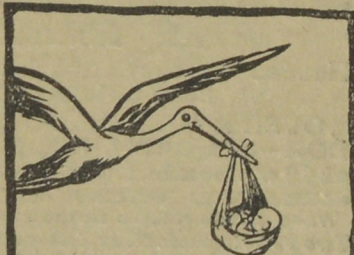
REV. J. S. MULLAN

5-14, "For the love of Christ constraineth us." Rev. F. W. Murray, pastor of the congregation led in prayer. The Convener then narrated the steps in the case reading the official documents dealing with the restoration and welcomed Mr. Mullan to the office of the Ministry. The message of the Presbytery was then delivered to the congregation and the Benediction was given by Mr. Mullan.

Throughout the proceedings depth of feeling and conviction and unanimity of spirit were everywhere manifest and it was apparent that all felt that a new chapter in the history of this congregation had been commenced.

DETAILS OF CASE

Mr. Mulla was deposed by the Presbytery some fifteen years ago. Numbers of his congregation gave him their support and for several years he was minister of an independent church at Stanley. The Provincial Government of the day in view of his deposition withdrew Mr. Mullan's license to solemnize marriages. That was restored to him recently, largely through his son-in-law John A. Young, M.P.P.



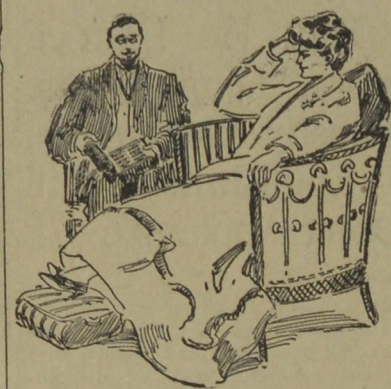

At the close of the building trades' strike in the spring the minimum wage was fixed at \$2.25 per day but since that time employers have been paying less than that wage and men have accepting less. The daily wage which seems to be the most acceptable to all is \$2. per day.

Work on the various contracts about the city is held up. At the Normal School annex for which J. Fred Ryan is contractor masons today are at work at parts of the construction for which helpers are not needed.
