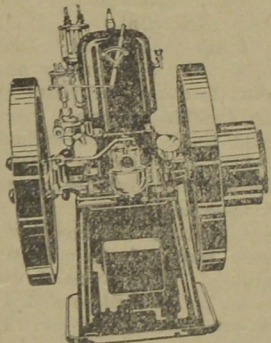

## JAKE STAHL RESIGNS MANAGERSHIP OF RED SOX OF BOSTON

Follows Disagreement With Pres. Mc-  
Aleer--Bill Carrigan of Lewiston,  
Me., is His Successor

Boston, July 15--The announcement that Manager "Jake" Stahl, of the Red Sox, would sever his connection with the team which he led to a world's championship last season was not unexpected here.

Close followers of the falling fortunes of the Red Sox this season had been led to look for some such development as a result of a disagreement, according to some of their associates, was the reported desire of Stahl to supplant McAleer as president. The latter was told of a movement believed to be directed toward making Stahl president. When Stahl was asked about the matter he is understood to have disclaimed all knowledge of it.

Another factor in the situation was Stahl's inability to play first base this season. At the beginning of the season Stahl found that an old foot injury bothered him so that he was unable to play. An operation on Stahl's foot was successfully performed more than a month ago, but the manager never recovered sufficiently to play. Stahl retired from the game before and took a position in a Chicago bank. He was induced by McAleer and by his own father-in-law, C. A. Randle, of Chicago, to take the managership of the Red Sox in 1911.

Bill Carrigan, who succeeded Stahl as manager, has a reputation around the American League circuit as one of the leading baseball strategists among active players. In the fight for the American League championship last season Carrigan, with Captain Wagner and Manager Stahl, formed a "board of strategy" which directed the team's tactics.

The new manager is twenty-nine years old and a native of Lewiston, Me. He came to Boston from Holy Cross College in 1906 and has been with the Red Sox since, except for part of the season of 1907, when he played with Toronto.

### NEW PLAYERS FOR BANGOR

The Bangor team has been strengthened by the signing of McManus formerly star pitcher for Holy Cross College. The Maine aggregation has also secured two new infielders.

St. John, July 15--Fighting hard on every play and with the stands roaring encouragement, the old-time rivals, Fredericton and Marathons, played a real contest on the local grounds yesterday afternoon. The Caps won by a score of 4 to 3.

Dedrich started the game for the visitors, but after working well for five innings with only two singles against him, he was touched for a couple of safe ones in the sixth and after Callahan failed to handle an easy roller, Dedrich blew up. The Greeks ran the bases for three scores before Dedrich straightened away, and Condon was sent in to bat for Dedrich in the seventh.
