REV. J. S. MULLAN
RESTORED TO MINISTRY
BY PRESBYTERY

Famous Church Case, Which Was
Open for Years, Closed at Stanley
Yesterday—Proceedings Were
Most Impressive

A large and deeply interested congregation assembled in the Presbyterian Church at Stanley on Tuesday afternoon to take part in the public restoration of Mr. James S. Mullan to the office of the Ministry. This was the final event in the history of a case which has been before the church courts for years. The desire on the part of all parties concerned to reach a satisfactory settlement found expression in certain resolutions adopted over a year ago. The General Assembly having granted permission to restore Mr. Mullan to the office of the ministry, the Presbytery of St. John at its last regular meeting formally removed the sentence of deposition and sent a committee to Stanley to give public effect to its finding and welcome Mr. Mullan. The committee consisted of Rev. Dr. W. H. Smith, Convener, Rev. M. J. Macpherson of Harvey and Rev. J. H. A. Anderson, of St. John.

SERVICE HELD

The service was led by the Convener of the committee, Rev. M. J. Macpherson reading the Scriptures and Rev. J. H. A. Anderson leading in prayer. Dr. Smith preached the sermon taking for the text 2 Cor.

UNION DELEGATES
AND CONTRACTORS
CONFERRED TODAY

Minimum Wage For Hode Carriers
of \$2 Per Day is Proposed—Answers
From Hod Carriers Union Expected
Thursday

Delegates from the Plumbers' Union, the Masons' Union the Hod Carriers' Union and the Carpenters' Union met the contractors of the city this morning with regard to the strike of hod-carriers which went into effect this week. As a result of the conference a proposal to make the minimum wage for hod-carriers two dollars per day is to be submitted to the Hod Carriers Union and an answer is expected tomorrow.

The delegation asked the contractors if they recognized the unions and the reply was that the question of recognition had been settled before and that the unions were recognized. The matter of a minimum wage for hod-carriers and masons' helpers was then considered and it was determined by mutual consent to place it at \$2 per day. This figure will be submitted to the Hod Carriers' Union and if it is accepted by its members the strike will be ended.
