the fight will undoubtedly go on until the end of the week, when the House will automatically rise for Sunday. So the fight will continue, according to the plans of the opposition, next week and thereafter until they force the government to recognize the justice of their demands, either for a Canadian navy along the lines already approved by the Canadian people and by the Conservative party itself in 1909, or else appeal to the people as to whether or not they approve of the resurrection of the ancient Roman policy of colonial tribute.

There is talk of the government turning its attention to silencing the debate by introducing the closure. This would ill become the party which so prolonged the reciprocity debate in 1911. It would also be ineffective because the opposition would continue the fight over that measure just as determinedly.

Parliament has evidently reached an impasse. The defenders of the popular cause represent a majority of the popular vote at the last election. It is clearly a matter which should be decided by the people themselves. This is what the Liberals are fighting for and intend to compel, when the time comes their war cry will again be the old British clarion call of "God defend the right."

A CROWN LAND POLICY BROUGHT DOWN HOUSE

crown timber lands to go up for sale on the first of August 1918, what would happen? The large capitalists coming from outside of New Brunswick to bid for the leases of the timber lands would not compete with the large lumbermen but would compete with the small operator and leave him without an acre of the crown timber lands.

What results might be reasonably expected from the adoption of this measure. He was not only hopeful, but he had the strongest faith that the passage of this act would deal in a proper and effective way with the leasing of the crown timber lands, and he felt sure that it would result in great industrial development for the province in the bringing into New Brunswick of many millions of dollars of foreign capital.

PULP AND PAPER

Before proceeding further with the possibilities for the development of the pulp and paper industry in New Brunswick as a result of the adoption of this measure, he desired to refer briefly to a statement in a memorandum submitted by the New Brunswick Lumbermen's Protective Association, whose case was so magnanimously presented by the delegation of small operators who intervened the government in this assembly chamber a few evenings ago and at which meeting many hon. members were in attendance. The small operators in their memorandum say that it is not in the interests of the province that a monopoly of the leases of the crown timber lands should be created, and he desired to point out

to hon. members and the people of New Brunswick that the government had in a practical and fair way met the wishes of the small operators in this regard.

He had already pointed out the projected establishment of the pulp and paper mill at Bathurst, and he was pleased to inform hon. members that only a few days ago he had received a letter from the Dominion Pulp Co., saying that it was the wish of the company to double their output the moment that conditions would warrant them. As a result of this legislation hon. members could confidently expect great expansion in this important industry.

In addition to the mills on the North Shore there was located at St. John the large mill of the Edward Partington Pulp & Paper Co., who hon. members were aware had recently acquired the extensive Gibson lumber lands. The passage of this bill would give the Partington Co. the permanency of tenure necessary to enable them to go ahead and develop their industry as they had been seeking to do for the past few months.

Preceding up the St. John River there was the prospect of the development of the power at Grand Falls and the establishment of a pulp and paper enterprise, which he was told would be one of the largest plants on the continent, and would be capable of producing 150 tons of finished paper a day. The establishment of such a great industry will mean the development of one of the greatest water powers of the province, and in the manufacture of the pulp and paper, not only would the timber of New Brunswick be used, but timber would be brought to Grand Falls from Quebec and the State of Maine to feed this great mammoth industry and keep it going in perpetuity. The establishment of such an enter-

sive enterprise would mean further the creation of a town of 8,000, or 10,000 people at Grand Falls, as large as this beautiful City of Fredericton.

It seemed to him a low and reasonable estimate to make that in five years time there would be established in the province pulp and paper industries representing from \$10,000,000 to \$50,000,000 of capital affording

employment to thousands of men, and creating a great boom to the people of the province. In his judgment this Legislature had been asked to deal with no bill of such great importance for many years.

He asked the earnest consideration of hon. members to the bill, and he trusted that its provisions would result in great and lasting good to the people of the province.
