POLICE COMMISSION RECOMMENDED UNAMENDED

(Continued from page eight.)

commission would be presented to the Legislature.

ALD. MITCHELL.

Ald. Moses Mitchell stated that he was opposed to the original bill and favorable to the amendment. He wanted an independent police commission. To have the mayor a member would make the election of one member of the commission a yearly issue of civic politics. He claimed three-quarters of the people of Fredericton were favorable to the amendment.

DR. KIERSTEAD.

Dr. W. C. Kierstead, speaking for a citizens' committee, advanced the claim that the appointment of a member of the commission for a five-year term would result in a greater degree of independence than would be secured by the appointment of the mayor as a member. The people of Fredericton by their ballots on Monday had said they wanted a commission which would enforce all the laws. The City Council had held a plebiscite but not on the question of an independent commission. The amendment cast no reflection upon Mayor Hooper. Events had shown that had a mayoralty candidate been put in the field against Mr. Hooper he would have been defeated. He had been unopposed because it had been customary to permit a mayor to have two terms. But if it were true that Mayor Hooper were objected to for personal and political reasons, then that showed that the appointment of a mayor as a member of the police commission would throw the matter into civic politics.

REV. DR. SMITH

Rev. Dr. W. H. Smith said that those supporting the bill had been practically accused of bad faith in the matter of details of the personnel of the commission. He stated that the movement for an independent police commission had begun last summer but the personnel of such commission had not been mentioned. When the bill was presented to the house the mayor was mentioned as a commissioner because it was necessary to present some form of commission to the legislature. Personally he had agreed to the mayor being named on the understanding that the bill would be amended in committee. It had been hinted that there was an intention of belittling the present mayor. There was no such intention. In another year, there probably would be another gentleman occupying the mayor's chair. What was wanted was an independent police commission. If the five-year term was too long it might be reduced. But the city of Fredericton should be given a fair chance to try an independent police commission. If after a proper period the system was found unworkable then it would be time to try something else.

BISHOP RICHARDSON

His Lordship Bishop Richardson made a short address explaining his own position in the matter of the original bill and amendment. He had taken an active part in the movement for such a commission and had signed the petition for the bill. He had signed it on good faith expecting that the bill would be presented to the House. Later it was learned that there was a desire to have the bill amended. He himself and Dr. Steeves also after considerable argument agreed to support the amendment. They had done that in order that a united front might be presented. He had been asked by the members for York what were his personal views on the matter and to that he would say that he favored the original bill. He hoped with all his heart, however, that some sys-

tem would be secured under which proper enforcement of law would be secured.

Mr. E. A. McKay was heard in support of the amendment.

During the course of his remarks Hon. H. F. McLeod interrupted to say that there was no mandate from the people for a commission composed according to either the original bill or the proposed amendment.

EX-ALD. GUTHRIE.

Ex-Ald. P. A. Guthrie, opposing the amendment, stated that the whole reason for bringing in the amendment was opposition to the present mayor, a man who had been elected by acclamation, the people all being favorable to him and against whom no candidate had had the courage to run.

ALD. FARRELL AGAIN.

Ald. Farrell was heard again. With regard to the feeling of respect expressed for Mayor Hooper by supporters of the amendment, he could say that Ald. Weddall had been approached by that party to oppose Mayor Hooper and had refused.

Ald. Weddall stated that he had been approached not by a party but by a number of citizens.

Mr. Slipp asked why the old City Council had not given the citizens an opportunity to vote for an independent police commission.

Ald. Farrell stated that an elective commission was considered to be independent.

Hon. Mr. McLeod—"The questions asked in the plebiscite did not mean very much of anything."

Dr. Kierstead pointed out that if it were true that the opposition was to Mayor Hooper personally then the commission outlined in the original petition would not take the matter out of civic politics.

HON. H. F. McLEOD.

Provincial Secretary McLeod stated that the members for York had not been taken into the confidence of the promoters of the bill. He thought, however, that it was not a question of "the mayor" but of "What mayor?" The members for York were not inclined to give Mayor Hooper a slap in the face. Neither the commission of the bill or of the amendment was independent. He was sorry that he found it necessary to differ from so many of his friends, honorable and reputable citizens, but he and the members for York would vote for the original bill and he felt the legislature would support them.

City Clerk McCready made a plea for a fair chance for Fredericton to administer its police affairs and administer its laws.

Mr. L. P. D. Tilley suggested that a licence law similar to that in force in Ontario with a local option clause would get around many difficulties.

The delegation then withdrew, the committee promising consideration.

I.R.C. OFFICIALS HERE

Mr. W. B. MacKenzie of Moncton Chief Engineer of the I.R.C. and Mr. H. J. McGrath of Dorchester, Inspector of Masonry for the I.R.C., arrived in the city last night registering at the Queen. Mr. MacKenzie informed a reporter of the Mail that nothing was yet known concerning the construction of freight sheds at the local I.R.C. terminals.

A BIG INDUSTRY.

The bill relating to the New Brunswick Shales Limited, was agreed to in the Legislature yesterday with amendments. Hon. Mr. Flemming said that Sir William McKenzie had told him that the company's intention was to commence operations with a single unit of machinery and gradually add to it. The cost of machinery, etc., for a single unit would be \$2,000,000 and employment would be furnished for 1,500 men. There would be 400,000 tons of shale used in a year by a single unit and the royalty on that amount coming into the treasury of the province would be \$40,000 per year. This company had spent between \$99,000 and \$100,000 in investigation and development work and there seemed little doubt but that the project would go ahead successfully.
