**TORIES ARE AT LAST
OUT IN THE OPEN**

(Toronto Globe.)

The re-organizers of the British
empire have come out into the open,
and the greatest political battle in
Canada since confederation has be-
gun. It can be settled only at the
polls after the people have opportu-
nity of learning how great and
epoch-making are the issues raised by
Mr. Borden's naval bill. There is no
longer the pretence of concealment
as to the meaning of that measure.
It is the first step in the re-organ-
ization of the British empire on the
basis of centralization of authority
at Westminster. For two genera-
tions, ever since Lord Durham's re-
port following upon the rebellion of
1837, the tendency has been towards
greater and greater powers of colon-
ial self-government. Now the over-
seas dominions, if the centralizers
have their way, are to be degraded
from the standing of self-governing
nations within the empire and are to
become "provinces" of the empire.

Here, then, is a great issue. It is
deliberately raised by Mr. Borden. It
can be met only in one way, by the
alliance of all men in the dominions
who believe in self-government. The
Canadian and British News of Can-
ada, the organ of the British-born
in the Dominion, puts the case plain-
ly in an editorial.

"Alliance, not subordination," it
says, "is the only safety for the
future."

The policy of centralization that
would prevent Canada from undertak-
ing her own naval defence and would
subordinate the overseas dominions
in that respect to a group of bureau-
crats at Westminster must be faced
and fought by Canadians and Aus-
tralians, native-born and British-
born. No matter what the land of
our birth, whether on this side of
the Atlantic, in the Motherland, or
in the far Pacific, we are all Britons,
all sons of the empire, and de-
termined to prevent the reservation
of naval defence or any other of the
obligations of self-government to a
central organization in which, for a
generation at least, the overseas
dominions could have no effective
voice.

CONSERVATIVE PRESS REPORTS ARE DENIED

Ottawa, March 11.—To what ex-
tent certain of the conservative
press is prepared to go in the mat-
ter of misrepresentation an untruth
in connection with the great consti-
tutional struggle being waged was
again emphasized in Parliament on
Monday afternoon. As soon as the
orders of the day were called Mr.
W. H. White, Liberal member for
Victoria, Alberta, rose to a ques-
tion of privilege. He directed at-
tention to reports of the Parlia-
mentary naval discussion appearing
in the Conservative press in which
it was represented that he had tak-
en "a fling at the United Empire
Loyalists."

"I need not tell honorable gentle-
ment of this House or those who
have access to Hansard," said Mr.
White, that these articles are fabri-
cations; that they are untrue in
every particular; that I never made
any statements of the kind."

The ingenuity of the writers of the
reports of which Mr. White com-
plained, and of the system of news
supply which is feeding the Conser-
vative newspapers at this juncture,
is shown by the wording of the
despatches. Mr. White is alleged to
have described the United Empire
Loyalists as "short-horns" who fled
in fear from their New England
homes and left their cattle to
starve. He is also alleged to have
declared that he served in the
Strathcona Horse in South Africa,
and other brilliant feats of the im-
agination are brought into play. "I
was never in South Africa in my
life, and never said I was," Mr.
White told the House in character-
izing the reports as "willful un-
truths."

It would appear that the report of
Mr. White's speech which was pre-
pared for the Conservative press
must have emanated from the same
source as the "canned" editorials
and news articles which are being
disseminated in the Government
press. It is not supposed that it
was concocted by any regular cor-
respondent of the Press Gallery. As
a matter of fact the correspondents
of the Government press made no
serious attempt to cover the all-week
discussion, and for hours at a time
during the night vigils were not pre-
sent. The correspondents of the
Liberal and of the French press
organized in relays and have follow-
ed every minute of the whole week's
sitting from the Press Gallery. By
this means they have kept their re-
ports accurate.

Major Sam Sharpe complained of a
report which made it appear that he
was opposed to the Borden proposals
as a result of his response to Hon.
Mr. Graham the other night relative
to a Canadian navy as a permanent
policy. He was supporting the Gov-
ernment policy, he said.

BIG COLLEGE TO MEET IN DEBATE

New Haven, Conn., March 13.—
Harvard, Princeton and Yale are to
meet tomorrow night in their annual
triangular debating contest and the
event promises to be one of the most
interesting of the college year. Yale
and Harvard will meet at Cambridge
Princeton and Harvard at Princeton
and Princeton and Yale in New Haven.
The question to be argued is,
"Resolved That the United States
should exempt her coastwise traffic
from Panama Canal tolls." In each
case the home team will support the
negative side of the question.

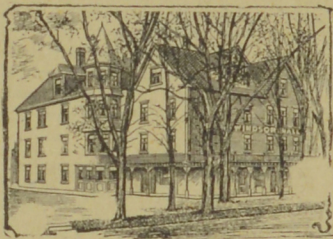
