MILLIONS OF DOLLARS IN TOURIST BUSINESS

The Maritime Provinces Should be the
Summer Land for Pleasure Seekers of
the United States and Western Canada
--Good Roads A Factor in Attracting
Tourists

Mr. F. W. Bowes contributes the following interesting article to the New Year's number of the Halifax Chronicle on tourist business. What he says of Nova Scotia is equally applicable to New Brunswick.

There is so much to say in favor of the tourist business that it at once becomes a many-sided subject, but for the purposes of this letter four phases may be briefly considered.

1. The ideal climate and the many advantages that Nova Scotia possesses to attract tourists.
2. The importance from a monetary standpoint of tourists trade and the home market it creates.
3. The desire of the people south and west to come this far north.
4. The requirements of tourists and how to meet them.

ATTRACTIONS UNRIVALLED

With each return of the summer season, with its many charms of outdoor life, attention centres on the best possible solution of the problem where to spend vacation days. To secure the utmost procurable in health, enjoyment, reinvigoration and the pleasurable passing of time away from heated city surroundings amid enjoyable scenes with agreeable companionship is the ideal universally sought. A great variety of tastes among those who seek summer outings complicates the matter of deciding on what to do by the large number of available places in Nova Scotia tend to simplify to a large degree the settling of the question. Perhaps the greatest factor in determining where to go in most families is enjoyable visits in the past and the hope of renewing them. Another factor of importance is the experience of friends, by which many persons are largely guided. Possibly the first realm which enters into a choice of a summer abiding place is whether one desires to seek seaside, climb hills or to enjoy the delights of the country, neither close to the sea nor among the hills, although the breeze of one and the distant view of the other may add to enjoyment.

This Province is in reality a vast ocean park, with an ideal summer climate, where malaria is unknown, and where the nights are always sufficiently cool for comfort and rest. Within its scope may be found every variety of region, from the seaside sands to mountain peaks. Great stretches of the most beautiful regions of hill and dale, watered by broad rivers and dotted with lakes of all sizes of scenic variety. We

have within our borders the wide diversity and infinite variety of scenes and surrounding which provide for every taste.

PROFITABLE BUSINESS.

Superficial consideration of tourist business will not reveal its possibilities, but as soon as it is contemplated reflectively the results will be astonishing. For example, suppose Halifax had 1,000 visitors for one day and they each spent \$10, our city would be enriched to the extent of \$10,000. If Nova Scotia had 100,000 tourists for one day and each expended \$10, it would mean \$1,000,000. If 100,000 tourists came to this province and remained ten days and each one spent only \$5 a day, they would leave \$5,000,000, and if they spent \$10 a day, our merchants, our hotels (and perforce dealers of all kinds) and others would be financially benefited to the vast extent of \$10,000,000. This is just a flash of light on what tourists would do if the business were properly developed.

Tourist trade is in actuality an almost universal form of reciprocity that every one can be in favor of. The larger the influx of tourists in the province the larger market for our produce is at our door. There are no freights to pay, there are no grounds for arguments as to whether the exporter or importer or consumer pays the duty. The more tourists that come the greater the consumption our gardeners and farmers and fishermen have to sell and the more cash eventually reaches the merchants and dealers and everybody else, for it is recognized by those who have studied the subject that money received from tourists is more generally distributed among all classes than any other revenue. The greatest mortgage lifter known is tourist trade.

CANADIAN AND AMERICAN TOURISTS WANT TO COME.

In the past many thousands of citizens from Quebec, Ontario and further west—the large majority of them the wealthier class—have every year gone to the summer resorts of Maine and New Hampshire, but there has been a marked tendency of late among these desirable people to come and see the Maritime Provinces, and it is growing because visitors have been pleased and their recommendations bring others.

By far the major part of our tourist trade comes from the states of Massachusetts and New York and there the "go to Nova Scotia" tendency is developing rapidly, as "hundreds" (Continued on page three.)

WILL HEAR APPEAL IN SUGAR CASE

Washington, D.C., Jan. 6.—One of the first important matters on the docket of the Supreme Court of the United States, which reconvened today after the holiday recess, is the appeal in the case of Charles R. Heike, former secretary of the American Sugar Refining Company. Three years ago this month Heike was indicted on charges of conspiring with employees of the American Sugar Refining Company to defraud the government by underweighing imports of sugar. Heike gave evidence before the grand jury and at the trials of several of those indicted with him and on this ground his attorneys endeavored to prove him immune from prosecution. But after a long and bitter legal battle Heike was convicted in New York and sentenced to a term in prison.
