In the year 1903-04 the British "deadweight" debt was £770,778,762. From that time onward the debt has been steadily reduced-with the exception of one year-until a statement just issued for 1912-13 shows the debt to be £674,744,567. That is in in Canadian money the debt has decreased from \$3,853,893,810 to \$3,373-722,835, or an absolute reduction in the national debt of \$480,170,975.
