Among the communications for consideration the secretary read one from Hon. Justice Barry, whose term of office expired with yesterday's meeting. It was laid on the table until a later stage of the business.

ADMITTED AS STUDENT NURSE.

Upon the recommendation of Dr. Vanwart and the matron and upon the secretary being satisfied with educational qualifications it was ordered that Miss Lowretta McGivney, probationer, be accepted as a student nurse.

A letter received from the manufacturers informed the board that the new X-Ray plant would be shipped in a few days.

The secretary was directed to place the correspondence in the hands of Mr. G. N. Babbitt or Dr. McGinnis of the U.N.B., so that they may mature plans for the reception of the machine.

On motion of the mayor the secretary was directed to request Mr. George Armstrong of Lower St. Mary's, to continue his good will to the hospital by again auditing the accounts in conjunction with Mr. Sterling.

ALD. FARRELL TRUSTEE.

At this stage the letter of President Barry was considered and after nice and deserved words had been spoken by all the members re the loss the hospital would experience by the retirement of Judge Barry, His Worship Mayor Hooper, seconded by Mr. McMurray, presented a resolution to the effect that the board accept the resignation of President Barry, with very great regret. In buoyant words the mayor referred to some of the acts of Judge Barry and questioned the advisability of retaining a by-law which forced men of usefulness off the board.

Mr. Whitehead then moved that the vacancy be filled by the election of Ald. W. E. Farrell and as there was no opposition Ald. Farrell was unanimously elected.

PRESIDENT ELECTED.

Vice-President Sterling, who has always taken a deep interest in everyday pertaining to the hospital, was then nominated by Mr. Clark for the position of president and unanimously elected. Mr. Sterling gracefully accepted and said he would always be at the call of the hospital.

Mr. Whitehead was then elected vice-president and owing to the condition of his health, he hesitated about accepting the honor but was finally prevailed upon to do so.

A letter from Mr. J. S. Neill, with his handsome contribution towards the cost of the X-Ray plant, was formally before the board and Mr. Clark, from the committee, said that probably at the next meeting of the board, a full statement would be presented. Already seven \$100 subscriptions had been received by the committee.

The committee was continued in power after a vote of thanks had been passed to the members.

Many other matters were dismissed before the board adjourned.

POLICE COMMISSION

two triennially by the lieutenant-governor in council, with eligibility of re-appointment.

(b) That the section fifteen of the Act, Chapter 42, Acts of 1908, being the section allowed the board of police commissioners to be dissolved and put at an end by a vote of the city council be repealed; and

(c) That the said Act and amending acts shall come into force on a certain day.

IN SUPPORT OF PETITION.

At the request of the mayor, Dr. Steeves, chairman of the delegation, stated briefly that what the petitioners sought was a police commission independent of the city council and thus removed from civic politics.

His Worship asked if there was any guarantee in the event of the city council agreeing, that the government would appoint a commission.

Dr. Steeves replied that as a whole the government had not been approached, but some members were favorable.

His Worship pointed out that on a former occasion the government had refused absolutely to appoint a second commission after the first had gone out of existence.

His Lordship Bishop Richardson expressed the opinion that the refusal of the government on that occasion was caused by a desire not to appear discourteous to the city council as that body had not asked that a commission be appointed. Personally he felt that the delegation could bring this matter to the attraction of the government should the council agree.

In reply to Ald. O'Neill Dr. Steeves stated that Fredericton would be placed in a position similar to that in which St. John found itself with regard to the police force should the suggestions of the petitioners become law.

Ald. O'Neill remarked that in St. John they were now endeavoring to get the control of the police department in the hands of the people's representatives. He could not favor the suggested amendments of the petitioners.

BISHOP RICHARDSON.

Bishop Richardson expressed the opinion that a provincially appointed police commission would be the salvation of the province as those concerned in law enforcement would be removed from the sphere of local influence. The petition was presented in no spirit of antagonism to the city council but to enable its members to carry out their duties more effectively than otherwise they could.

Ald. O'Neill said: "The government may ask us for what reason the citizens change their minds so often."

His Lordship—"Experience."

Bishop Richardson pointed out that if the appointment of two commissioners was in the power of the city council it might be possible to have a majority of a commission unfavorable to the enforcement of the Scott Act. If that power lay in the government such a state of affairs would not be so apt to occur.

ALD. FARRELL.

Ald. Farrell thought the petition did not go far enough. He was favorable to having the majority rule but he was strongly favorable to an independent commission. He would place the appointment of the commission in the hands of the citizens. The provincial government knew nothing of conditions in Fredericton and should not have the power of appointing commissioners.

Ald. Farrell suggested the election of a commission by the citizens, to consist of three members, one dropping out each year.

As an alderman he was not impressed with the proposition of the government appointing two members and the city council a third.

MR. McKAY EXPLAINS.

Mr. E. A. McKay pointed out that the desire was to remove from the city council the power of putting a police commission out of power by a two-thirds vote or any other kind of vote. That was what was meant by "independence." The personnel of the commission was an entirely different matter. A hundred suggestions with regard to the appointment of the commission might be made.

Ald. Farrell's suggestion for an elective commission was a good one, but could be considered apart from the other matter.

Ald. Farrell stated that he did not wish to be understood as opposing the idea of the delegation. He did not think that joint-appointment by government and city council was sufficiently independent.

His Lordship Bishop Richardson could not support Ald. Farrell's suggestion to give the citizens the power of electing the police commission. It was giving a tremendous bribe to the lawless element of the city to get together and attempt to elect a commission to serve its own ends. It might be argued that the good element might also organize but it must be recognized that there was a large indifferent section of the electorate which could hardly be induced to vote in such a matter and the element which was favorable to evil was

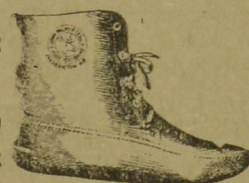
