## MUNICIPAL COUNCILORS IN A FAULT FINDING MOOD

(Continued from page one)

Couns. Sloat and Cowperthwaite thought the bye-law passed in a wise way and the interests of the people were safeguarded by reason of the fact that no order could exceed the appropriation. The motion was lost on being put to the Council.

Coun. Graham moved that the York Council or any committee of the York Council should not receive or pass any bill unless it be itemized. Motion carried.

### TOO MUCH WOOD

Coun. Hugh Smith asked for information with regard to 75 cords of wood being supplied for the Court House and Common Gaol at \$5 per \$5.50 a cord as shown on page 65 of the auditor's report. He thought the amount large for one year.

Coun. Haining explained that he bought in open market and this explained the difference in prices. He also contended that the old furnace burned up more wood than it was worth and then gave no heat and that was the reason he recommended a new furnace.

Coun. Harry Smith explained that they called for tenders but the tenders put in called for more money per cord than they could get it for in open market.

Coun. Hugh Smith said the price was alright.

Coun. Walker said they had taken a view into the matter last January and found what it had cost for eight years back for wood to supply the county buildings and contended that the hot water system of heating was a great saving.

Coun. Harry Smith also showed on behalf of the Building Committee that a substantial saving was made since the installation of the new system.

### IMPORTANT CONFERENCE

Coun. McMullin explained the nature of the proceedings at the meeting of the committee of the municipal council with the delegates for the council of the City of Fredericton. The city were disposed to have a separate goal and court house, and to break apart from the county in reference to the administration of Justice. He had no recommendation to make but thought the city was putting up a bluff and that the county could call it as they already paid two-thirds of the expenses of the administration of justice while at the same time the county owned the goal and the court house.

Coun. Merrithew raised the question of eight prisoners from McAdam being in the county gaol and maintained at the county expenses when the council had appropriated \$500 for a lock-up there.

Coun. Skeene explained that prisoners could only be held in a goal for forty-eight hours, and while the lock-up had not yet been built, still he could not see even if it were, how that would do away with bringing them to the goal.

Coun. Stairs claimed that some of those arrested for stealing rides on the train were Americans and should be looked after by the emigration officials.

Coun. Essensa moved that the printing be let out at tender and that those putting in tenders furnish schedule of prices. Motion carried.

Coun. McMullin moved that the matter be dealt with by Committees of County and City Councils concerning the administration of justice be open for discussion.

### WOULD CALL THE "BLUFF"

Coun. Skeene, Smith, Brewer and Stairs contended that the city were bluffing in stating they wanted distinct municipalities in reference to this matter, and that if it were a good thing for the county that the county call the bluff.

Coun. Essensa held that it was better to give them a further chance and moved that the same committee be continued to confer again with the city council to give them the understanding that they bear one-half the expenses of administration of justice or else secede. He thought this time they should make short work of it as the county owned the buildings. Motion carried. Coun. Skeene raised the question of non-resident peddlars going through the county and paying no tax or license. He Coun. Skeene gave notice of resolution to fix the license fees for non-residents peddlars as follows:

Pack peddlars ..... \$50  
One horse ..... \$125  
Two horses ..... \$200  
Jewelry ..... \$200

The matter was deferred till tomorrow morning in the suggestion of the warden.

Coun. Graham asked where authority was given for change of gratuity from \$20 to \$40 given the warden. He knew it was passed at both semi-annual sessions but was under the impression that \$20 was for the full year. The matter however closed after a slight discussion.

On motion meeting adjourned to meet at 2 o'clock.
