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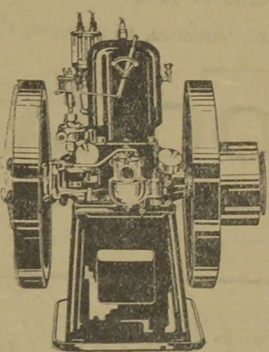

Marathon's Win Puts Fredericton in Lead

Pets in Lead Again--Greeks Solve St. Croix's Star Hurler and Fatten Averages--Tarbell was Effective at all Stages--Leaders Still Bunched

St. John, N. B., July 2--The Marathons won easily from St. Croix yesterday afternoon on the local grounds, and shut out the speedy team from the Border by the score of 10 to 0. The Greeks drove Lee, the star boxman of the St. Croix, from the mound, and in two innings piled up seven runs off the erratic heaver.

The Marathons played fast ball, and O'Brien, Pinkerton, Tarbell and Shankey showed a class of infield work that would be hard to beat. The big lead which the Greeks secured at the start took the edge off the contest, and as Tarbell was invincible, the game as a whole lacked snap, but several times O'Brien and Pinkerton brought the crowd up by sensational fielding stunts.

The Greeks scored two in the first on a single by Pinkerton, a pass to Shankey, and a double by Watt. Three passes by Lee, singles by Watt and Tarbell, and two errors gave the Marathons five runs in the second.

Spiller batted for Lee in the first of the third, and Parker, who went to the mound for St. Croix when the locals came to bat, held the Marathons scoreless until the fifth.

The runs were scored in the fifth on singles by Riley and Pinkerton, and a double by Tarbell; and the final tally was earned in the seventh on singles by Waterhouse, Tarbell and Pinkerton.

PHILADELPHIA PITCHER GAVE KNOCKOUT IN EXCHANGE FOR OATH

Says McGraw Swore at Him Before he Delivered Punches--Pres. Lynch to Investigate

Philadelphia, July 1--Addie Brennan, the Phillies' Southpaw, who floored McGraw of the Giants yesterday with a punch on the jaw, in an interview today shoulders the entire responsibility of the affair and exonerates every other Philadelphia player from the fracas. Sec. Foster of the New York club last night issued a statement, saying that when McGraw fell he was kicked and cuffed by other Philadelphia players while lying on the grounds.

This Brennan and the rest of the Phillies vehemently deny. Brennan says he was the only player to punch McGraw and that no teammate assisted him, nor did any kick McGraw. Addie said:

"As soon as I heard the vile oath McGraw directed at me, and then seeing him approach, I met him halfway, landing my left to his nose and following with a right-hand swing which floored Mac. Nothing else transpired, for Otto Knabe grabbed me, then I was hustled into the dressing room, while Mike Doolan assisted McGraw in getting to his feet.

"No player with any spirit would have taken what McGraw said to me and he deserved all he got."

McGraw refused to discuss the matter today.

LYNCH TO INVESTIGATE

New York, July 1--Pres. Thomas J. Lynch of the National League went to Philadelphia tonight to investigate Manager John J. McGraw of the gate the trouble which resulted in Giants' being felled by Brennan, a young pitcher of the Philadelphia team.

It is known that Mr. Lynch will take drastic action in the case, and if he can definitely place responsibility, the penalty meted out will be a heavy one.

LYNN RELEASES PFEFFER

Lynn, July 1--Big Jeff Pfeffer, the former National Leaguer who has been carried along by the Lynn New England League club since the season opened as a member of its pitching staff was released by Manager Flaherty today. The showing which Scanlon, a youngster has made caused Flaherty to drop Pfeffer.

Scanlon played with Houlton last year in the N.B. and Maine League.

DEDRICH RELEASED

Dedrich who has been on the Marathons pitching staff since the league started has been released. A new pitcher named McKie of Greenwood, Mass., has been signed on by the Marathons and will join the Greeks at Bangor today. The Marathons leave this morning for Bangor where they play a game this afternoon and will play a double header at Bangor tomorrow.

FOX-STEALING RIFE IN ISLAND PROVINCE

Charlottetown, P.E.I., June 25--Queen's county jail in Charlottetown had not a single prisoner in it last week, and for some time past King's County jail in Georgetown had had only one, James A. McInnis, who will be tried for manslaughter the middle of next month. Prince county, however, is unfortunately making up for what the other two counties are lacking. The Supreme Court, which is still in session at Summerside, has twelve criminal cases up for trial. The accused were:--John Murray, charged with arson; James A. Webber, with larceny; Jas. Cahil and Benjamin Sonier, with shop-breaking; Edgar Cannon, with stealing foxes from the Belle River Ranch and also from George Barbour; Frank Dawson with larceny; Ernest Stapleton, with stealing foxes from J. E. Birch; Thomas Murray, with larceny, breaking jail and conspiracy to steal foxes; Charles Burns, also with conspiracy to steal foxes, and Lem Coughlan, with receiving foxes.

WORST RECORD FOR YEARS

The Grand Jury found true bills in all cases with the exception of Frank Dawson and Charles Burns. This is one of the worst criminal records on the Island for many years. It will be noted that fox-stealing is the principal charge, and as Prince county has by far the largest number of ranches on the Island, the theft is naturally more prominent there than in other parts. The small ranchers have been the worst losers. The larger companies can afford to adopt effective measures for the protection of their property, including watchmen, blood-hounds, a system of burglar alarms, man-traps and other devices.

Armed with a pair of nippers the thief had little difficulty in cutting the wire of the different enclosures and getting at the foxes. At this season the temptation to steal young foxes, which are worth from \$6,000 to \$10,000 each, is very great as the pups are so small they can be easily concealed and shipped off the Island, while in some cases, no doubt, they are sent back again and sold here.

SEVERE PENALTIES PROVIDED
At the last session of the Legislature a number of acts were passed to cover especially the crime for

fox stealing, and making the penalty very severe. In the fox cases tried so far Ernest Stapleton pleaded guilty. He also appeared as Crown witness in the case against Lemuel Coughlan, and told that he and Thomas Gallant went to Birch's ranch on January 2nd and stole foxes, delivering them to C. E. Maxwell, of Fortune Cove, but he denied that Coughlan had anything to do with the foxes as far as he knew.

TWO MEN WANTED

A warrant was issued for Thomas Gallant, but he is still at large. His seven-year-old boy, Ernest, was on the stand, but the lawyers could make very little out of his testimony. It was generally believed that he had been tampered with. The Grand Jury felt sure of this that they brought in a statement to that effect in their report to the Judge.

Maxwell is also wanted by the authorities, and his son Russel, was also put on the stand, but was no more disposed to tell where his

father was than young Gallant. At the close of Maxwell's evidence the Attorney-General moved for a stay of proceedings which was granted, and Coughlan was discharged on his own recognizance for \$2,000. This means that he may be tried at any subsequent session of the court on the same charge.

The case against John Murray was adjourned, the prisoner being released burning a barn belonging to a man named Horne, of lot 4, in the year 1909.

BENCH WARRANT FOR CANNON

The case of Edgar Cannon, at the time of writing, is still before the court. The other cases have yet to be tried. Thomas Murray has been in jail on a charge of larceny then, but was released to go at large for nearly two years. He and vote at the general election. He managed to escape across to the main land in a motor boat, but came back last fall and is said to have had a hand in the fox-stealing. Since then he has been missing and a bench warrant has been issued for his arrest.

The Grand Jury were evidently impressed with the necessity to stop this epidemic of crime, and in their report recommended that a Pinkerton detective be employed in connection with the fox cases.

The salary of Joseph Weber, president of the American Federation of Musicians, has been raised to \$5,000 a year.
