Employ of Dominion Public Works
Department to Become City Engineer of Maple Creek, Sask.

Mr. John L. Feeney, B.S., of this city has resigned as assistant engineer for the Dominion Government on the Courtney Bay development works and has decided to accept a tempting offer made him to take the position of city engineer at Maple Creek, Sask., one of the fast growing towns of the west. The new position carries which is a substantial salary and comes as recognition of ability displayed by Mr. Feeney during his tenure of a similar office in this city.

Mr. Feeney is a son of Mr. Thomas Feeney, proprietor of the Lorne Hotel, and is a graduate of the University of New Brunswick. He is a very popular young man and as well as a competent engineer and his many friends in this city will follow his career with interest.

Mr. Feeney returns home from St. John tomorrow and will leave for Maple Creek on Monday or Tuesday of next week to enter upon his duties.

ASSESSMENT ROLL
NOW IN HANDS
OF TREASURER

Inside Rate This Year Will be \$1.50
Per 100—Assessable Real and
Personal Property Close to
Five Million Dollars

The board of assessors have completed their work on the assessment roll for 1913 and it is now in the hands of the City Treasurer who is preparing the tax notices. The total assessment for the year is \$90,000, the chief item of which is \$22,000 appropriated for schools, showing an increase of \$2000, requested by the Board of School Trustees. An increase of \$200 was also made in the annual grant to the Victoria Hospital making the aid to that institution \$1,000 in lieu of the former grant of \$800.

The total value of real estate in the city available for assessment is \$3,326,633, Personal estate, \$1,661,220 and Income \$636,685. The rate for those inside the fire and water district has been placed at \$1.50, while the outside rate is \$1.00.

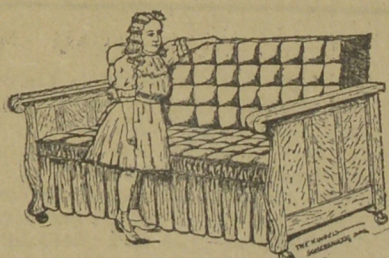
