NOTICE OF LEGISLATION

The City of Fredericton will present at the approaching Session of the Legislative Assembly of New Brunswick the following bills for enactment:

(1) A Bill authorizing the City to grant certain concessions to the Palmer-McLellan Company, Limited, and to fix the valuation of the property of Frasers Limited in this City for taxation purposes.

(2) A Bill to authorize the issue of Debentures for the erection of a Fire Station, a Police Station, for the purchase of Queen's Park and for the further construction of Permanent Street Pavements, not exceeding in the whole the sum of Forty-five Thousand Dollars (\$45,000)

such school might be established on the North Shore, where the agricultural interest of Restigouche, Gloucester and Northumberland might be more conveniently served.

The question of representation of the Maritime Provinces in the Federal Parliament had again engaged the attention of the Government during the past year, with the result that a concerted action would be taken by the Maritime Provinces to prevent a decrease in their Federal representation.

The Hon. gentleman who had moved the adoption of the address had expressed in beautiful language and lofty sentiments and expression of hope for the future of the Province, in which he felt sure that all members in common with himself would heartily concur. Indeed New Brunswick was awakening; it was bubbling over with opportunities, and the people of this Province need no longer look with jealous misgivings toward the Prairie Province.

With such splendid resources what need was there of a sturdy New Brunswick to emigrate? Let him stay home and help to develop the resources of this country, both from the standpoint of practical success as from that of true patriotism. In the words of the poet Scott, "Breathes there a man with soul so dead, who never to himself hath said; this is my own my native land." Therefore let every New Brunswicker get into the firing line let him blaze away at something, let him stay in the fight and help to make New Brunswick the banner Province of the Dominion, remembering always that the greatest marksman that the world had ever produced had been men who wasted some powder in practice. Let not a little failure discourage him, but let him work on until he reaches the goal of his success.

In conclusion he said that he was convinced that the Legislature foreshadowed in the speech from the Throne will rebound to the best interests of the Province, and it afforded him much pleasure to second the address.

THE OPPOSITION LEADER

Mr. Dugal said that he wished to congratulate the mover and the seconder of the address upon the eloquent manner in which they had addressed the house. He was not acquainted with the procedure of the house and would wait until another occasion before having anything further to say.

PREMIER FLEMMING

Hon. Mr. Flemming said that he wished first of all to offer his congratulations to those who, had so ably and eloquently moved and seconded the address, and was sure that he expressed the feelings of not only all the members of the House but also everybody who were present in the Assembly Chamber, when he hoped that the political career of the Hon. Member for St. John city (Mr. Tilley) would be of as great benefit to the Province as that of his father, the late Sir Leonard Tilley who had begun his career in the Provincial Legislature before the days of Confederation and had afterwards gone into the broader field of Federal politics after Confederation, having taken a prominent part at Ottawa in the foundation of the great structure upon which the Dominion of Canada was built, and which was now drawing the attention and the envious eyes of the whole world.

He also wished to congratulate the seconder of the address upon the excellent speech, and he was sure that all would admit that in the Legislature there was a need for business men such as Mr. Hachey, who could look at matters from a business standpoint and who at the

same time were able to express themselves as eloquently as the member for Gloucester had done.

SOME BOASTING

Regarding the member for Madawaska they might as well capitulate at once, for they are surrounded on all sides by the supporters of the Government and had no opportunity even for a flank movement found themselves supported by practically all the members of the House. He was not so concerned as to who should occupy the position which he did, but he rounded by such a large number of supporters because therein was the answer of the people to the men who went out into the Province after the last House had been dissolved to make a campaign of misrepresentation against the Government.

It was fitting that reference should be made in the Speech of His Honor to the visit of H.R.H. the Duke of Connaught and party, to this Province during the past year. Their Royal Highnesses had received a cordial reception from the people of New Brunswick, who had been glad of an opportunity to pay honor to members of the Royal Family.

Probably the most important paragraph in the Speech was that relating to agriculture which has been aptly stated was the backbone of this country. A speaker had said that New Brunswick's farm products last year amounted to between \$19,000,000 and \$20,000,000 and that this Province might have produced double that amount. This would give an idea of the opportunities for increasing the production from the land in New Brunswick, for if the present production was increased by only 50 per cent. it would mean \$10,000,000 more annually would go into the pockets of the farmers and that there would be that much more prosperity enjoyed by the people of the country.

MARITIME REPRESENTATION

Regarding the matter of representation it had already been decided by the Courts that the Maritime Pro-

vinces had no legal claim, but nevertheless the Government felt—and he believed that the people of the Province generally concurred—that they had a right to go to Ottawa and make their case and that they should receive the attention of the Federal authorities. He believed that it was a reasonable contention that there should be no further reduction in the representation of the Maritime Provinces.

During recess the Maritime Provinces had also presented their case at Ottawa for a compensation in connection with the Public lands of the Dominion, and he felt justified in using a term which had previously been used in the House and saying that an absolutely unanswerable case had been presented.

THE FISHERIES CLAIM

Hon. Mr. Flemming said that the old claim of the province in regard to the fisheries still remained unsettled, despite the efforts of the government to secure the adjustment with the federal administration. He did not propose to censure the federal government, but it did seem to him that there had not been fair consideration given by either party in federal politics to the claims of the province of New Brunswick relative to fishery matters.

No question can ever be settled until it is settled right. No just claims of the province of New Brunswick will ever be allowed to die by this government, which will continue to press in the most vigorous and forcible manner possible for a settlement of what is believed to be just claims.

He desired to tell Hon. members of this House and the people of New Brunswick generally that this government was bringing to bear the full of its ability to present the claims of New Brunswick in this matter, and he felt that this government was doing everything that could be done by an administration watching carefully and working honestly in the interests of the people of New Brunswick.

The address was adopted without division.

OTHER BUSINESS.

Hon. Mr. McLeod presented the returns of the bonded indebtedness of the municipalities of Victoria, Kings, Kent, Restigouche and Northumberland and the towns of Chatham and Dalhousie.

Hon. Mr. McLeod presented the returns of the provincial elections, also the annual report of the Chancellor of the University of New Brunswick.

Hon. Mr. Flemming moved that Rev. Dr. W. H. Smith be elected chaplain of the Legislative Assembly.

Hon. Mr. Flemming submitted a copy of the agreement with J. Douglas Black for reporting the debates of the Legislative Assembly. The agreement was concurred in and the official reporter was assigned a seat

on the floors of the House.

Hon. Mr. Flemming moved that the committee to nominate standing committees consist of Hon. Messrs. Flemming, Grimmer and McLeod and Messrs. Mahoney and Dugal.

Hon. Mr. Grimmer introduced a bill to consolidate the act regarding rates and taxes.

Hon. Mr. Grimmer introduced a bill to amend the act creating a Public Utilities Commission. He explained that the bill provided that the Board of Public Utilities Commissioners shall have their powers enlarged so that they may act in conjunction with the Dominion Railway Commission in matters affecting railways with provincial charters.

Hon. Mr. Flemming moved that Mr. Dickson, Albert, be the Deputy Speaker and Chairman of the Committee on Supply.

The House adjourned at 6 o'clock.
