

# OPPORTUNITY FOR LIBERALS TO HELP ALONG THE CAUSE

Ottawa, May 7, 1913.

## TO THE LIBERALS OF NEW BRUNSWICK:

Efficient organization is the keystone of success in business or politics. The recognition of this fact and the request to their supporters to join in sharing the necessary expense brought success to the Democratic leaders and their party in the United States Presidential elections last year. The funds for legitimate party purposes, such as organization, printing, publicity and travelling expenses, were raised by a popular subscription.

The Liberals of New Brunswick are in need of more thorough organization, of committee work and wider distribution of party literature, for which purposes a considerable sum of money will be required. We believe all loyal supporters of the party will be ready and willing to subscribe to such a fund, and we ask them to do so.

The Liberals are today fighting in the House of Commons for free speech and the people's liberties. We do not know how soon they may be called upon to struggle for their rights at the polls.

We must be ready. The Liberal party must be ready and the only way to be prepared is to organize.

In asking the financial assistance of Liberals, for that purpose we are inviting every member of the party to co-operate and stand shoulder to shoulder with us in this memorable struggle. We neither expect nor desire assistance from the trusts, or wealthy corporations, whose interests may clash with the interests of the common people, and this appeal is therefore made to the masses of the electorate, who desire to maintain the rights of the people. It is far more desirable in the interest of the party that the subscriptions should be general, coming from every parish in the province, in other words, that there should be a large number of subscribers for small amounts rather than a small number of subscribers for large amounts.

Subscriptions for any amount from one dollar and upwards will be received by those in the different polling districts in the parishes who are authorized to do so, as well as by the County Treasurers, who will forward all amounts they receive directly, as well as those from parish collectors, to the Provincial Treasurer who will acknowledge the same.

The funds collected will be expended under the direction of the undersigned Provincial Committee representing the Liberal members from New Brunswick in the House of Commons and subject to the audit of Henry E. Hill, of St. Stephen.

## LLOYD GEORGE FLAYS HIS MARCONI CRITICS

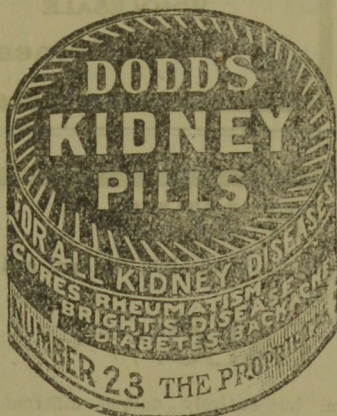
London, July 1.—Mr. Lloyd George hit back at his critics in the Marconi business at a luncheon given him by Sir Rufus Isaacs at the National Liberal Club today. Hon. Winston Churchill sat next to the Chancellor. After testifying that the more reputable and more honorable section of the Tory press had declined to join the "unctious, famous man-hunt," Mr. Lloyd George said he wished he could say that of the Tory party in the Commons. He and Sir Rufus Isaacs through the dark and dreary winter had been silent while calumny was hurled from every quarter at their heads. It was the shabbiest chapter in the history of any party. For months every dastardly and cowardly journalist of the Tory party was shooting poisoned darts, knowing their hands were tied. His hands were free now, free to shield and to smite. His declaration was received by a tumult of cheers, and the Chancellor then proceeded to give a foretaste of how he would smite, if necessary. When he heard Mr. Bonar Law saying that the Ministers ought to be expelled from office who are guilty of indiscretion, and saw the Tory party rushing back from the Ascot races to pass a solemn vote of censure upon the semblance of gambling he had that cross-channel feeling. This euphemism for a current vernacular phrase was received with shrieks of laughter by the Liberals. It was characterized by the Tories as another instance of the Chancellor's tendency at Limehouse.

## MOTHER'S PENSION

Trenton, N. J., July 1.—County clerks throughout New Jersey report numerous applications for widows' pensions under the new State law which became operative today. Under the provisions of the law a pension of \$9 a month is to be paid to widows with one child under the age of 16 years. Fourteen dollars a month will be allowed for two children under 16, with \$4 a month for each additional child under that age.



## ROADS GIVE UP JOB AS HOPELESS

Chicago, Ill., July 1.—The American Railroad Employees and Investors' Association, which was formed about five years ago for the purpose of trying to check legislation hostile to railroads and also to bring about a better understanding between the railroads and their employees, closed its offices in this city today and ended its existence. While the official announcement of the disbanding says the railroads are satisfied that the work of the association is accomplished, it is said that as a matter of fact the roads have given up the roads as hopeless. It is pointed out that more States are passing legislation detrimental to railroads each year and the employees are getting more radical in their claims. P. H. Morrissey, who has been president of the association since its formation, has accepted a position as assistant to the vice-president of the Burlington road. Before becoming president of the association Mr. Morrissey was at the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen.

## WOMAN'S FIGHT TO BECOME LAWYER

London, July 1.—A woman, as the English statutes are at present, cannot act as a solicitor. She can, however, according to the statements made in the courts today, act as Queen, marshal, champion of England, sexton, churchwarden, constable, workhouse governor, returning officer and overseer of the poor. C. A. Buckmaster, Assistant Secretary of the Board of Education, also stated that there were instances of a woman acting as keeper of a prison gate house and as keeper of a jail. It was stated also that Anne, Countess of Pembroke as hereditary sheriff, sat at the Assizes with the Judges on the Bench, and although it is not said in the books that she administered justice, that was obviously meant.

The foregoing list of a woman's activities was mentioned during the hearing in the Chancery Division of the action brought by Miss Gwyneth Marjorie Bobb to obtain from the Law Society a declaration that she is a "person" within the meaning of the solicitors act and entitled to be admitted to act as a solicitor.

Mr. Buckmaster submitted that there was nothing in the solicitors acts repugnant to the inclusion of a woman within the meaning of the word "person," and instanced other countries in which women practise law. The hearing was adjourned.

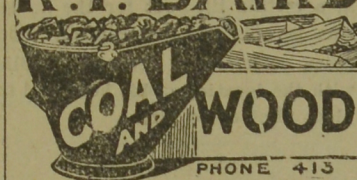

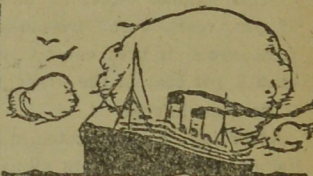
