FUNDED DEBT OF C. P. R. WIPED OUT

(Montreal Star)

Canadian Pacific after July 1, will have practically no funded debt, and will alone of all the large railroads on this continent be absolutely assured of freedom from default and foreclosure.

It is paying off the first mortgage \$ p.c. bonds of which there are \$35,000,000 outstanding. They are not due until July 1, 1915, but offer of redemption on July 1 this year will be accepted and the bonds retired.

Barring some odd amounts of other bonds of small aggregate value capital obligations will consist of 1 p.c. debenture stock, 4 p.c. preference stock and common stock. In case of default on the debentures no foreclosure is involved, but all surplus income is available for liquidation of the defaulted interest until that is taken care of.

Sir Thomas Shaughnessy says: "Canadian Pacific is unique among railroads in that no foreclosure is possible. Our bonds barring some small scattered amounts will be paid off by July 1."

From then on practically our entire income will accrue to debenture holders and stockholders. There are roughly \$165,000,000 debentures outstanding. If the time should ever come—not that I think it ever likely—that Canadian Pacific must default on its debentures, holders of those securities would become owners of the property until prosperity once more returned and the debenture holders had received the full income accruing to them. Whereupon the former status of the company would be restored and stockholders again assume ownership."

In the United States there is hardly a railroad that has not added greatly to its fixed charges during the last decade. Canadian Pacific has gradually wiped out the bonded debt by using the proceeds from the sale of land; the company still owns over 6,000,000 acres.




