SQUIRE DAGGETT'S DEATH

St. Andrews Beacon: Edmund Daggett, J.P., better known as "Squire" Daggett, one of the best known residents of Grand Manan, died on Friday aged 78 years. He had been a resident of the island all his life. He was the first trustee under the free school law when it came into operation in 1871, became secretary of the board and remained in that position until a few months ago when he resigned on account of failing health. The deceased was commissioner of the parish courts of Grand Manan for fifty years. The late Mr. Daggett was an active member of the Baptist Church and a conservative. He leaves two sons J. B. Daggett, (Secretary of Agriculture, of Fredericton), and Ralph Daggett, of Vancouver, B.C., and three daughters

FISHERY OFFICER
HAS SCRAP WITH
TWO POACHERS

Knocked One of Them Overboard With a Blow From a Paddle---Illegal Fishing Carried on Nightly at the Hartt's Island Pool

Drifting for salmon has been reported on good authority to be going on nightly at the Hartt's Island Pool. The pool is about five miles above the city and a capital spot for fly fishing but many with unsportsmanlike tendencies have been getting in their work in the last few days and the fishery officials have decided to make a determined effort to put a stop to it. A complaint was lodged this morning with the fishery officers in this city and they are going to make a thorough investigation of the case with a view to convicting the guilty parties.

HAD EXCITING TIME

Fishery officer F. L. Barnett of Kingsclear had an exciting experience a few nights ago in catching two offenders. They were drifting in the pool when Mr. Barnett noted them but on his trying to make an arrest they propelled rocks and other ammunition at him with telling effect. Mr. Barnett gave pursuit however, and on reaching the canoe occupied by the poachers struck one of them in the neck with his paddle with such effect as to place him hors de combat. The fellow tumbled out of the canoe and would undoubtedly have been drowned had not Mr. Barnett pulled him out of danger. The other offender was not of the same warlike state of mind but begged to have the scrap ended as he could not swim and was afraid of going overboard.

Both have since made overtures with a view to settlement and one fine has already been paid while the other is being adjusted.

WANTS NO MORE
COURT CASES FROM
ACROSS THE RIVER

Col. Marsh Says They are Unsatisfactory and it is Difficult to Get at the Truth--A Gibson Assault Case Sent to Marysville

Mr. Frank Hyde of Gibson encountered a number of loafers at the old bridge between Gibson and St. Mary's a few nights ago, when one of the number hurled a rock at him which peered through his coat-sleeve and inflicted a severe gash in his arm. Mr. Hyde has been compelled to wear his arm in a sling, and has invoked the aid of the authorities. Papers were served on the parties concerned in throwing the missile and the case came up for hearing before Magistrate Clayton at Marysville this morning.

The complaint was first lodged with police magistrate Marsh but he advised that some other magistrate be sought. In speaking to a Mail reporter this morning, His Honor,
