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### BOURASSA AND BORDEN

Henri Bourassa, the French Canadian Nationalist leader, is just now making a tour of the Canadian West, expounding his Nationalist doctrines to the English-speaking people there. His speeches make it clearer than ever that Mr. Borden's naval policy was dictated by the Nationalists as the price of their support during the last election campaign. This is especially shown by the facile manner in which Mr. Borden has taken advantage of the circumstances to do nothing, and, in Ontario, blame the Liberals for his lack of action.

Mr. Bourassa said at Edmonton, that Canada's national obligations to the empire should be measured by the extent of her privileges and liberties, and that as the sole control of the army and navy lay with the British parliament, England should bear the whole cost of imperial defence.

In introducing his naval bill on December 5th last, Mr. Borden said:

"It has been declared in the past, and even during recent years, that responsibility for foreign policy could not be shared by Great Britain with the dominions. In my humble opinion, the adherence to such a position could have but one, and that a most disastrous result. During my recent visit to the British Isles I ventured on many public occasions to propound the principle that the great dominions, sharing in the defence of the empire upon the high seas, must necessarily be entitled to share also in the responsibility for and in the control of foreign policy."

Mr. Bourassa says that without any voice in British foreign policy, Canada should not help in imperial defence; Mr. Borden says that to deny the great dominions sharing "in the defence of the empire upon the high seas" any voice in a foreign policy would have most disastrous results.

It is remarkable how the sentiments voiced by Bourassa, the anti-imperialist, synchronize with those of Borden, the jingo leader of the Conservative party. With such a sharing of views, it is not surprising that Mr. Borden's policy came to nothing, and that he not only abandoned the parliamentary scheme of a Canadian navy, but also his own much heralded scheme of paying tribute to the admiralty.

Sir George Ross in his speech on the Naval Bill pointed out that everything provided by the Borden \$35,000,000 contribution bill could be done under the Laurier Naval Bill of 1910, and more, with the difference that the money would be spent under Parliamentary control instead of being turned over in a lump for the government to handle at its own will. Had Mr. Borden been sincere when he made his hysterical appeal for protection against the thunder he heard and the lightning he saw on the horizon he would have provided for a vote of \$10,000,000 or \$20,000,000 in the estimates for naval contribution when his pet bill was referred to the people by the Senate. He refused to do this. Was he more interested in securing the "unearned increment" from handling this \$35,000,000 than aiding the Empire?

We are told by the Tory press that dredging operations are to start here this week. This will be good news for the boys who have been promised soft jobs for the summer months. As usual the old timers who were fighting the battles of the Tory party long before Mr. O. S. Crockett, M. P. got over the fence will be disappointed.

The new twenty thousand dollar manager of the Intercolonial Railway has come and gone. He failed to enlighten the public as to why the government road with its million dollar surplus last year had found it necessary to boost freight rates.

### THE ARMAMENT TRUST

Following the startling revelations of Liebknecht in the German Reichstag, The London Labor Leader, a British weekly, has been investigating "the armour platers scandal" ramifications in England and recently in Canada. The connection between the Borden government and the armament trusts is shown up:

"It is significant that the Canadian government first made an offer of a gift to the British navy in the year that Messrs. Vickers were announced to open their yard at Montreal, while in the Navy League Annual of 1911-12 (page 10), Mr. Alan Burgoyne assures us that the new works of the Canadian Shipbuilding Co., Ltd., (capital \$10,000,000), a subsidiary as shown above, of John Brown and Company at Sydney, Cape Breton Isle, 'will probably be the largest shipbuilding plant either in Great Britain or America,' and that 'the associated companies believe that within six years' time they will be able to make the largest ordnance now required for imperial dreadnoughts, even to the 13-5 in. gun.'"

Sir R. P. Roblin, formerly opened the new public market in Winnipeg, last week. We are told by the Telegram newspaper that hundreds of housewives took advantage of cheap produce offered direct from market gardens. The big western city is now in line with Fredericton which has had a free public market for many years.

Canadian smokers managed to burn out over nine hundred million cigarettes last year. That was certainly going some.

The matter of car-shops for the St. John & Quebec Railway and the suitability of Fredericton as a location for such was laid before the minister. Hon. Mr. Cochrane stated that this city situated as it was at the present point of connection between the Canada Eastern Branch of the I.R.C. and the new line had most noticeable geographical advantages. The entire question of the location of the shops would be considered most thoroughly. Reports would be prepared.

With regard to the construction of a Union Station here the minister said that such a building certainly was desirable but certain matters must be taken into consideration before the department could reach a decision. Most important of these were the proposition of traffic the I.R.C. would have passing through it and the proportion of cost of maintenance that the railway department bears. Approached in the matters of improvement the first class car service on the Canada Eastern end of the I.R.C. freight terminals in Fredericton the railway officials agreed that both were needed most urgently and stated that the department was prepared to meet the committee more than half way in those matters.

They asked if a through car could be given Fredericton importance for freight east-bound from Montreal. The reply was that such could be done if the Fredericton merchants could guarantee a minimum quantity of freight. As far as the freight Department is concerned that new blood would be infused into it at headquarters and a more aggressive policy be pursued.
