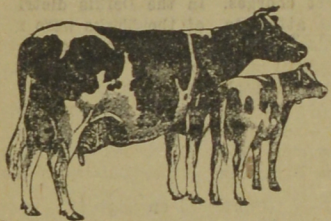

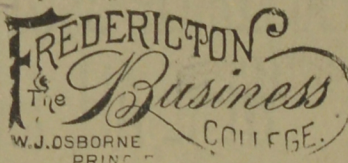

GETTING CLOSER

TO THE CONSUMER

"The great problem today before
the American people to devise ways
and means for the producer to reach
the consumer with the minimum cost
of handling his product," is the con-
clusion reached by the Massachusetts
Commission on the Cost of Living,
and since arrived at by the New
York State Investigating Commis-
sion. According to the New York
report, the consumer's dollar is absorbed
from forty to seventy per cent. of
the consumer's dollar is absorbed by
unnecessary handling and trucking,
while the percentage of increase be-
tween the price paid to the produc-
er and that paid by the consumer
in Philadelphia runs from seventy-
three to one hundred and fifty per
cent.

LONG LINE OF MIDDLEMEN

Before any systematic study of our
system of distributing was made, no
one probably had any idea of the
absurdity, costliness, and inadequacy
of the middlemen, says The House-
wives' League Magazine in discuss-
ing these reports. We did not know
how many nor how superfluous the
middlemen were, nor how long and
devious was the route of the farm
products to our tables at home. In-
vestigation has shown that "we have
been simply paying the middlemen
to get in the way," and that we
are taxed for every defect in our
transportation service.

As a substitute for the present
small retail food shop, the New
York Commission recommends food
department stores, buying direct,
receiving direct, and selling direct.
Not only would these markets be
much less expensive than the small
shop, it argues, but they could be
made sanitary and inviting.

FARMERS ARE LEFT OUT

The presenting marketing facilities
of Philadelphia do not seem to have
been arranged with the idea of getting
producer and consumer together,
the commission declares. Although
there are over twenty markets, two
of them municipally owned the num-
ber of farmers in them is small.
They are "not really farmers' mark-
ets in the old sense of the word,"
says Dr. King. "But groups of re-
tailers. The result is that prices of
the markets do not materially differ
from the prices in the various
retail stores."

The farmers urge that all too
often the markets protect the retail-
er rather than the farmer, and city
ordinances seem to have been enac-
ted with the special purpose of keep-
ing the farmer out of the town.
According to Dr. King, there is
nothing to prevent any retail dealer
from taking a stall in any private
market, or municipal market, and
representing himself as a farmer.
Many of them do, thus putting both
the farmer and honest dealer at a
disadvantage, and forcing the con-
sumer to conclude that there is no
advantage in buying at the market.
There are also numbers of vexatious
fees which the farmer who want to
sell their goods in the city have
to pay.

WANT BACKING

FOR BOND ISSUE

(Montreal Herald)

"The benefit which St. John, N.
B., will receive from the location of
the Norton-Griffiths concern on Court
enay Bay, seems now to depend
upon the stand to be taken by the
city, the county, and the provincial
government, regarding the request
of the company that they back two-
thirds of a bond issue will total
\$15,000,000," said Mr. J. King Kelley
registrar of the County of St. John
(N.B.), who is at the Windsor today.
So far the activities of Messrs.
Norton-Griffiths have been confined to
the starting of their dry dock, which
will, according to their recent state-
ment, need only fifteen or twenty
men as a regular force.

The English company now say that
if the various concerns guarantee \$10,
000,000 worth of their bonds, "the
guarantee" to be used as a sinking
fund, they will a \$15,000,000 issue of
bonds for the construction of a ship-
building plant.

The company's representatives met
the City Council few days ago, and
were told to call again. They have
not yet placed their proposals be-
fore the provincial government."

HARD THING ASKED FOR.

"I wish that we could lay aside
our political prejudices for a while,
I wish we could forget that we are
Liberals or Conservatives, and look
dispassionately at this three-fifths
requirement. As for myself, I have
sometimes voted for one party and
sometimes for the other, moreover,
there was a time when I, in common
with many others, thought that the
three-fifths clause in the license act
was a safeguard to local option by-
laws. But the more I see of the op-
eration of that three-fifths require-
ment the more I realize that it is a
handicap—yes, a double handicap, for
it sometimes prevents us from carry-
ing local option and it also inter-
feres with the enforcement of the
law, when we have carried it."—

CHARTER.

"The general manager maintained
that his action had been taken under
instructions from the president, Sir
Rodolphe Forget. But the serious
fact was that the payment of the
alleged debt of \$200,000 to Daoust
had been credited as a current loan
in the report to the government. All
financial institutions should be above
reproach, I must confess. I was
grievously shocked at the testimony
of Mr. J. P. Knight, the secretary
of the Bankers' Association. To the
layman such a proceeding savors of
the cravest irregularity and yet Mr.
Knight, the secretary of the Bank-
ers' Association, according to the
statement of the judge, gave his
imprimatur to the act."—Sir Wilfrid

GOVERNMENT MUST INTERVENE

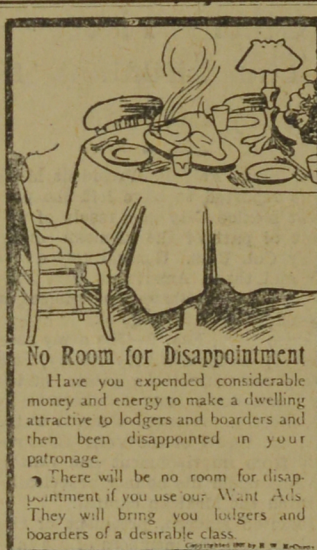
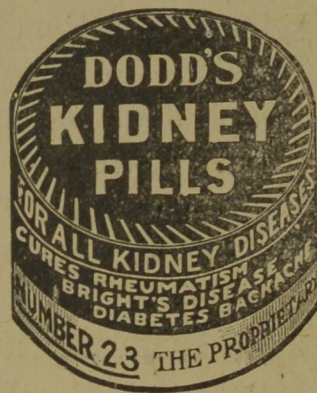
What was needed, he maintained,
