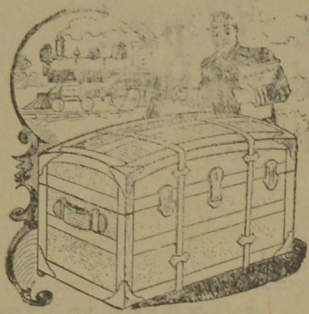

## Marysville Lost in Slow Game Saturday Night

### MAGNATES OF BASEBALL MEET IN NEW YORK

International League Meeting Today—  
Ed. Barrow Expected to be Re-elected President—Other Meetings

New York, Feb. 10.—Several days of important doings in baseball circles opened here this afternoon when the magnates of the International League assembled for their annual spring meeting, which will be followed tomorrow by the schedule meetings of the two major leagues.

Comparatively little business confronted the rulers of the International League outside of the election of officers and the adoption of a schedule. Apparently there was no opposition to the re-election of President Edward Barrow and no changes in the circuit were contemplated.

Nearly all of the club owners and managers of the National and American Leagues are in town for their meetings tomorrow. The general expectation is that no friction will develop in either meeting and that everything will be harmonious. Most interest centers in the possibility of some important trades resulting from the gathering of the managers.

The schedules of both leagues were completed by the joint committee more than a month ago and only await ratification at the hands of the magnates. Before the end of the week the schedules probably will be made public, so that the followers of the game all over the two circuits will be able to figure out how their favorite teams have been treated in the distribution of the season's most desirable holiday, Saturday and Sunday games.

### Second Effort at Six-men Hockey Was Slow and Team Except in Third Period—Score 6 to 2—Fred McLean Scored Five of Fredericton's Goals and Played Great Hockey—Crescents were off Color

Fredericton took sweet revenge on the Marysville Crescents Saturday night when the two teams again essayed the six-men game. The score was 6 to 2. As hockey the exhibition was very punk except in the last period when the players dropped the lady-like methods they had adopted up to that time and lived matters up.

The big noise of the evening's proceedings was Fred McLean. Fred tallied just five of Fredericton's six goals, leaving the remaining one to Alex. Galloway. McLean is said to have played stellar hockey in St. Stephen last week, but could hardly have done better than he did Saturday night. In general the Fredericton team played good hockey and Crescents were somewhat off color. The first two periods were so slow that six-men hockey, judging by remarks made by the spectators, received a set-back. Referee Staples was pretty severe with the penalties and the winning team got the most of them.

Marysville's great weakness appeared in the poor shooting of the forwards who were in about the worst form they have displayed this year. Fred Wade and Brogan were not so conspicuous with their rushes as they usually are and in goal Harry Robinson, though getting in the way of many shots which looked like goals, let enough get by to win the match for Fredericton.

As said before, Fred McLean was the star of the game, in fact he was in a class by himself, the other players of his own team and the Marysville men not coming near him. He played the wing position, although not accustomed to it, better than he did on the previous Saturday. Arnold on the other wing, played a hard, fast game, showing much improvement. Galloway at centre, was evidently playing at a disadvantage and was said to be suffering from a sore side. His goal however, was made by the prettiest play of the game, he taking the puck from the face-off and after running through Marysville's forwards and defence, scoring on a high shot that fooled Robinson. George Walker played cover and Hughes rover and the interchange of positions worked out well. In goal "Tart" Titus was as good as ever.

#### GAME IN DETAIL

The game began in the slowest way imaginable and some of the spectators yelled for "hockey" Crescents put Fredericton on the defensive and Titus made some good stops. The Red and White were pulling off some queer stuff at this time and had a hard time beating off Marysville's attack. After ten minutes' play McLean scored for Fredericton after a rush by the forwards.

Fredericton, 1; Marysville, 0. The period ended without any further scoring. In the second period Gordon Hovey scored the only goal tying the score. Play continued slow and there was lots of tripping. Arnold and Hughes were both off at once and two men short Fredericton did well to keep Crescents from getting more than one goal.

Fredericton, 1; Marysville, 1. In the last period, the rather slim crowd of spectators saw the only real hockey of the evening. Galloway began things when he tallied in about half a minute taking the rubber through the Crescents' team single-handed.

Fredericton, 2; Marysville, 1. From the face-off the Fredericton forwards got away and McLean scored on a side-shot.

Fredericton, 3; Marysville, 1. With the score 3 to 1 against them Crescents fought hard and it was not till after thirteen minutes play that McLean scored, Galloway taking the rubber to the Marysville end and McLean completing the play in most approved big-league style.

Fredericton, 4; Marysville, 1. Crescents made a spurt and kept the Red and White busy for a while Irving Wade scored Marysville's second and last goal after a rush by the Red and Blue forwards.

Fredericton, 4; Marysville, 2. With two minutes to play Fredericton put the game on ice by scoring twice in quick succession. From the face-off the rubber went to Fred McLean who beat Robinson out with a nice shot after he had gone well in on the net.

Fredericton, 5; Marysville, 2. Crescents made a desperate effort to score again and took the play to the Fredericton end. There Hughes got the puck and rushed to the other end where McLean scored on his pass.
