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CODERRE STILL SILENT

On March 17th last Mr. L. J. Gauthier, M.P., for Ste Hyacinthe, from his seat in Parliament charged Hon. Louis Coderre with having conspired at a systematic campaign of personation during his by-election after being called to the Cabinet as Secretary of State. Hon. Mr. Coderre made a blanket denial and then left the House, leaving his defence in the hands of the Minister of Justice. The latter made the charge that Mr. Coderre was being made the victim of a blackmailing scheme and that the whole thing was a matter for the election courts and not one for Parliament to decide. Premier Borden supported his Secretary of State and called upon his followers to whitewash him, which they did by a vote of 87 to 53.

On March 27th Mr. Tancred Marsil, through whom the charges against Hon. Louis Coderre were made wrote Hon. J. C. Doherty, Minister of Justice, who had charged him with blackmailing, pointing out that it was the Minister's duty to take criminal proceedings against him if he believed the charge to be true, and challenging Hon. Mr. Doherty to either take criminal action or withdraw his charge made under the privilege of Parliament.

The Minister of Justice did neither one thing nor the other. Hon. Louis Coderre has never seen fit to take any action to either clear his own name or give those he traduced an opportunity to clear themselves from the charge of blackmail.

For four months the Secretary of State has been content to allow serious charges of election corruption to lie against him without an effort to clear himself. For four months Premier Borden has retained in his cabinet a minister accused of flagrant corruption to hold his seat. For four months the Minister of Justice has refused to take action in the courts to substantiate the criminal charges he launched against Tancred Marsil and others, knowing he was safe in doing so under his privilege in Parliament.

During these same four months the people of Canada have become more and more accustomed to the idea of corruption and reckless charges against individuals by ministers of the government. The Borden government is debasing public opinion and lowering the standard of public morality.

The Halifax, N. S. Recorder:—What is the matter with the Lord's Day Alliance? Is it dead, or sleeping, or chloroformed for the time being? Yesterday we may say for the edification of those who did not know or have forgotten it—was Sunday, ten trains passed over the rails between the city and Windsor Junction; ten rushing, roaring, whistle-blowing, thundering murdering the Sabbath calm. Yet the Alliance probably neither saw or heard them. When Laurier was in power these same Sabbath Protectors could hear the creak of a hand trolley across half a continent. Now they are strangely deaf to the rush and thunder of a ten car train a hundred feet away. Did the Alliance come into existence merely to find fault with a Quebec Premier, and has it become chloroformed as soon as one of English race grasped the reins of power? It is up to the Alliance—if it still exists—to arise and explain, or else to crawl away and die.

St. John Times—Sir Wilfrid Laurier is receiving a very hearty welcome in the city of Montreal, where he is in conference with other leaders of the Liberal party. The outlook for the party in Canada is very bright. The more the people examine the record of the Borden government, especially with regard to the naval question, the brighter becomes the prospect of Liberal victory upon the first occasion when an appeal is made to the people. Mr. Borden will of course postpone that appeal as long as possible, even though such a course clearly exposes the humbug

emergency agitation of the last year. The course pursued by Sir Wilfrid Laurier with regard to the navy has been consistent throughout, and the Liberal party stands today on that question where it stood when Mr. Borden agreed with its policy, and before he had surrendered to Mr. Bourassa and the Nationalists of Quebec.

A monument to General Edward Braddock, who commanded the English troops in the war with the French and Indians was recently unveiled at Rockville, Md. General Braddock commanded a detachment of British troops who were waylaid by Indians in the Ohio Valley. He was warned by George Washington, then a young officer on his staff that the Indians were crafty fighters and he had better be on the lookout for them. His reply was that Indians could do nothing to the "King's trained troops." He marched his army through the Valley in close formation and it was practically wiped out by Indians. He therefore found out that Washington was right and he was wrong.

Hon. Frank Cochrane, the Tory Minister of Railways is certainly a vote getter for the Liberals. It is to be sincerely hoped that he will make another "tour of inspection" in the Maritime Provinces before the next election. Down in Nova Scotia the Minister's popularity is so great that the Stanfields of choice tomato fame are threatening to resign their seats on his account.

As it is not customary to oppose the return of a member of parliament who is seeking re-election after his appointment to office the Liberals of Portage La Prairie, will allow Hon. Arthur Meighen, solicitor general, an election by acclamation.

The St. Mary's Tories who are wondering why Mr. O. S. Crocker-McP. has become so chesty of late, will probably be interested in the announcement that he has secured the promise of a judgeship.
