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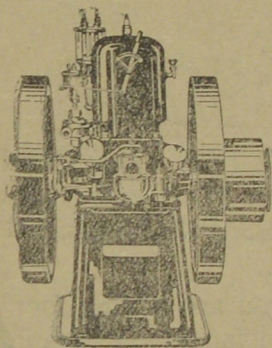

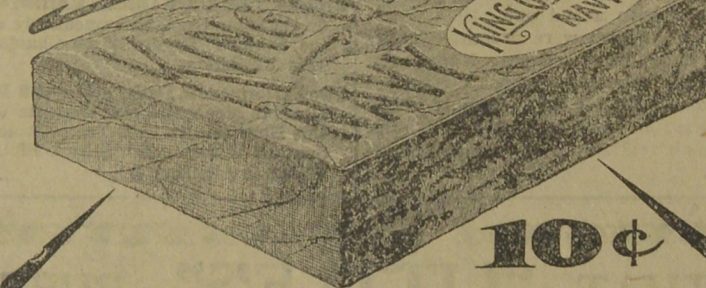

KING TO OPEN FIRST IRISH PARLIAMENT

London, July 9--It has been decided to ask the king and queen to open the first Irish Parliament, in Dublin. The home rule bill, which passed its third reading in the House of Commons on Monday and is now in something like its final form in a forecast of the procedure as regards the institution of home rule, the Daily News says:
